# 20.0 SERVICES IN UNINCORPORATED AREAS

This Section describes County services that are being provided within unincorporated areas of the Central Valleys, Pass Area, and Southwest Riverside County. Services being provided by CSAs are discussed within Section 19.0. The County services discussed in this section include:

- Law Enforcement
- Fire Protection
- Parks and Recreation
- Library Services

Animal Control

### 20.1 LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department provides the following services to all unincorporated areas as needed:

The Riverside County Sheriff Stations that serve the unincorporated MSR area include:

- The Cabazon Station, located at 50290 Main Street in Cabazon, serves the contract City of Calimesa, the unincorporated pass area around the Cities of Beaumont and Banning, and the unincorporated areas of Cabazon, Cherry Valley, Poppet Flats, San Gorgonio, San Timoteo Canyon, Twin Pines, and Whitewater.
- The Perris Station, located at 403 East 4th Street in Perris, serves the contract City of Canyon Lake as well as the unincorporated communities of Glen Valley, Mead Valley, Woodcrest, Romoland, and Sun City.
- The Southwest Station, located at 30755-A Auld Road in Murrieta, provides services to the City of Temecula area and the unincorporated communities of Aguanga, De Luz, La Cresta, Menifee, Murrieta Hot Springs, Pechanga, and Rancho California.

- The Hemet Station, located at 43950 Acacia Avenue Suite B in Hemet, provides service to the areas around the Cities of Hemet and San Jacinto and to the unincorporated communities of Aguanga, Anza, Cahuilla, East Hemet, Garner Valley, Gilman Hot Springs, Green Acres, Homeland, Idyllwild, Juniper Flats, Lake Riverside, Lakeview, Mountain Center, Nuevo, Pine Cove, Pine Meadow, Pinyon Pines, Sage, Soboba Hot Springs, Valle Vista, and Winchester.
- The Moreno Valley Station, located at 22850 Calle San Juan De Los Lagos in Moreno Valley, serves the unincorporated areas surrounding the City of Moreno Valley.

In FY 2004–05, there were 44,726 calls for service from the unincorporated areas being reviewed within this MSR. Table 20.A lists the number of total service calls from each station serving the unincorporated MSR area. Calls for services are received at the central dispatch center, where they are prioritized by the information provided by the caller. The highest priority calls are dispatched first. Of these calls, there were 1,179 (2.6 percent) Priority One calls from the unincorporated MSR area. Priority One calls involve life-threatening or potentially life-threatening situations, and the dispatch of an officer or officers is urgent.

The Sheriff's Department does not have a defined response time goal. Table 20.B lists the average law enforcement response times for each station serving the unincorporated MSR area. The County's adopted service standard is 1.2 full-time deputies per 1,000 residents. However, the actual service ratio varies daily due to fluctuations in staffing.

As shown in Section 2.0, the entire area included within this MSR is projected to continue to grow significantly through 2030. To meet the increasing need for law enforcement services, the Sheriff's Department plans to place future facilities where they could serve multiple areas. For instance, a County station that services both a contract city and an unincorporated area might be placed within the boundaries of the city itself so as to be easily accessible to its residents, but also situated in such a manner as to provide effective service to the County area as well. As service areas are redefined or population growth dictates, facilities are often built with future physical expansions anticipated, or new larger buildings are constructed to meet those needs. The positioning of equipment is driven by area need and/or regional response. For example, search and rescue units are stationed in locations where they are most often required, while the Sheriff's Department's SWAT, aviation unit, and hazardous devices team are centrally situated so as to provide adequate response times to the entire County.

The Sheriff's Department co-occupies facilities with various entities throughout the County. In Hemet and Cabazon, stations are shared with members of the Board of Supervisors (District Offices), while the Jurupa Station has a Community Meeting Room, dedicated for public use. The Ben Clark Training Center in Riverside is co-occupied by the Sheriff's Department, California Department of Forestry, California Highway Patrol, Southern Illinois University, and Riverside City College.

#### 20.2 FIRE PROTECTION SERVICES

Fire protection services in unincorporated County areas are provided by the Riverside County Fire Department. The Riverside County Fire Department provides various fire-related services, including emergency medical services, fire prevention, fire suppression, emergency medical services, disaster preparedness, fire safety inspections, hazardous materials tracing and enforcement, weed abatement inspections, and volunteer firefighting training and certification. There are currently 17 stations that serve the unincorporated MSR area, as shown in Table 20.C.

All Riverside County stations are dispatched by the same County Fire 9-1-1 Center and are part of the "Integrated Fire Protection System," under contract with the State of California. When a call is received, the dispatcher interrogates the caller and the appropriate fire/medical units are sent to the incident. The Riverside County Fire Department has general response time goals, which are based on

general land use type (urban, rural) and the distance of the fire station to the location of the service call. Table 20.D provides the Department's response time goals. All fire department calls, other than miscellaneous, are considered Priority One calls. Table 20.E provides the number and types of service calls for the stations that service the unincorporated MSR area. In total, there were 13,418 calls for service in FY 2004–05. Approximately 15 percent of the service calls were for fire and 66 percent of the service calls were for medical services. Table 20.F below lists the response times for each of the stations serving the unincorporated MSR area. The response times listed reflect the time from when the call was dispatched to when the department arrived on scene.

The California Master Mutual Aid Agreement provides for the rapid, organized deployment of fire service resources to other jurisdictions. All fire service jurisdictions in and around the MSR area are signatory to this agreement and would provide available resources to an incident occurring in the MSR area. Several of the stations share facilities with other agencies. This includes but is not limited to: County fire and City fire; State Fire and City Fire; County Fire and U.S. Department of Forestry (USFS), State Fire and USFS.

The Fire Department develops plans to meet the needs created by growth by reviewing statistical data and reviewing proposed developments. This review occurs prior to the development's construction phase and allows the fire department time to plan for new fire stations to serve the increased demand for services.

#### 20.3 PARK AND RECREATIONAL SERVICES

The Riverside County Regional Park and Open-Space District provides regional park facilities throughout the County. The regional facilities are typically large-scale and designed to serve residents from a large geographical area. Local parks within unincorporated areas are provided by districts and CSAs. The Regional Park and Open-Space District was formed on January 29, 1991. The District is an independent agency governed by the Board of Supervisors, which sits as the District Board of Directors. The regular meeting of the Board of Directors is each Tuesday at 1:30 p.m.

The District presently employs approximately 100 staff. The staff includes professionals in the fields of accounting and finance, biology, building and grounds maintenance, carpentry and construction,

ecology, environmental restoration, historic preservation, interpretation, landscape architecture, museum and curatorial management, park planning, personnel administration, recreation, security, trails planning and construction, weddings and special event planning, and wildlife habitat management.

The District has an advisory commission, which was established by the Park District Board of Directors (Riverside County Board of Supervisors) on June 28, 1994. The purpose of the advisory commission is to advise and make recommendations to the Board concerning the planning, acquisition, development, and use of parks and open space in unincorporated portions of Riverside County. Additionally, the advisory commission is to advise the Board on matters relating to the acquisition, development, maintenance, and promotion of regional recreation trails in the County and matters relating to the conservation and propagation of fish and game in the County.

There are several regional facilities within the MSR area that are provided by the Regional Park and Open-Space District. Table 20.G lists the facilities within the MSR area.

## 20.4 LIBRARY SERVICES

The Riverside County Library System provides library services to the unincorporated County areas. The County Library System is managed and operated by an outside management company, Library Systems and Services, LLC, since 1997. The County Library System is primarily funded by a Library District Tax, which is levied throughout all unincorporated areas. In addition, funding is provided by the Riverside County Library Foundation, which was established in 1998 to strengthen and expand funding sources for the Library System. Expansion of facilities and services is also partially funded through development impact fees. Table 20.H lists the facilities that serve the unincorporated MSR area.

The County Library System administrator has stated that there are no County-adopted library service standards. Needs for additional services, facilities, and equipment are driven by local need. Similarly, as growth within the County Library service area occurs, the County Library coordinates with local jurisdictions to add facilities. It is difficult to accurately determine the level of services the library system is providing within the unincorporated MSR area because this specific population is not tracked in the same manner as the population within cities or within the County as a whole. In addition, residents from all over the County, including cities, can use any library facility.

# 20.5 ANIMAL CONTROL SERVICES

Animal control services within the unincorporated MSR area is provided by the Riverside County Department of Animal Services. Within the MSR area the department operates the Hemet Animal Control Office with one animal control officer. Coverage is provided from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. daily. Shelter services within the MSR area are provided by contract with the Ramona Humane Society in San Jacinto, and Animal Friends of the Valleys in Lake Elsinore. Additionally, the following shelters provided by other organizations exist within the MSR area:

- Banning/Beaumont (Inland Empire SPCA), 2242 E. Charles Street, Banning
- Moreno Valley Animal Services, 14041 Elsworth Street, Moreno Valley

The County provides the following animal control services:

- Clinic Services: spaying and neutering; vaccinations; low-cost rabies clinics; microchipping; quarantine of animals; euthanizing
- Field Services: stray, injured, and dead animal complaints; animal turn-in; cruelty investigations; barking dog complaints; leash law violations; rabies reports; bite reports and quarantines; potentially dangerous, dangerous, and vicious dog hearings; dog license inspection/collect fees; kennel license requests/inspections; emergency response and investigations; subpoenas for records
- Shelter Services: adoptions; animal turn-in; animal behavior classes; upkeep of impounded animals; and animal records
