

Request for Qualifications and Quotes for Independent Fiscal Analysis

The Riverside Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) is seeking fiscal consulting services to assist in the evaluation of a proposed detachment from the Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District (District) of all territory currently within the boundaries of the City of Menifee (City). The proposed boundary change is being requested by the City. The City is also requesting the transfer of the authority to levy existing assessments from the District to the City.

General

Local Agency Formation Commissions (LAFCOs) are local public regulatory and planning bodies created by the State Legislature to coordinate the orderly development of local agencies, such as cities and special districts, and associated provision of public services. This is accomplished primarily through the regulation of public agency boundaries.

LAFCOs are governed by the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000 (CKH). CKH authorizes LAFCOs to “approve with or without amendment, wholly, partially, or conditionally, or disapprove proposals” for boundary changes. Among the conditions LAFCO may impose are the transfer of authority for the administration of special taxes or assessment districts and the transfer of authority to levy and collect previously authorized taxes, assessments, fees and charges.

Background

The City was incorporated in 2008. The territory of the City includes approximately 50 square miles and is bisected by Interstate 215. Menifee’s current population is approaching 90,000.

Prior to incorporation, recreation and park services in the general area were provided by two different entities. The County of Riverside provided park maintenance and operations west of I-215 through one or more County Service Areas (CSAs). As territory on the east side of I-215 developed, subdivisions were annexed to the District to receive services. In addition to the east side of Menifee, the District served a large area within Riverside County, including the Cities of Hemet and San Jacinto and surrounding unincorporated communities, such as Winchester. Since the mid to late 1980’s, approximately 20 parks have been developed in the east side of the City, which are currently maintained by the District.

Upon incorporation, with few exceptions, all County facilities were transferred to the City, as was the authority over CSA taxes, assessments and charges. For several

years the City continued to contract with the county to maintain the former CSA recreation facilities. The service area and responsibilities of the District were not changed by incorporation. It was assumed that the City Council, over time, would evaluate whether a) park and recreation services would ultimately be assumed by the City throughout its corporate boundaries or b) the District would expand its jurisdiction to include the entire City. Therefore, responsibility for park and recreation services within the City has been, and is currently, split between the two agencies, with the approximate dividing line being the I-215 freeway.

Approximately three years ago the City began the process of analyzing how park and recreation services would be provided in the future. Subsequently, the City established its own Community Services Department and ultimately opted to pursue detachment from the District and assumption of those services City-wide.

Proposed Boundary Change

The City has submitted a proposal to detach all City territory currently within the boundaries of the District from the District. The application also requests transfer of the authority to levy assessments currently collected by the District. The assessments assumed by the City would fund the services the City would be providing.

The assessments for the local services in question are levied through three assessment districts, each with multiple zones. Two of the three assessment districts are split by the proposed detachment boundary (the City boundary); however, only one zone is split. There are approximately 30 zones wholly or partially within the detachment area.

The District has objected to the detachment and the transfer of the authority to levy and collect assessments.

Services Requested

- A review of available documentation, including, but not limited to, the assessment engineer's reports for the affected assessment districts and zones, the City's Plan of Services, which includes cost assumptions for taking over District services, comments from the District and responses from the City.
- An analysis of the methodology employed by the City to determine the cost of assuming services and the allocation of those costs to the assessment district zones.
- Based on the above, a determination of the reasonableness of the assumption of the authority to levy the existing assessments. If the consultant determines transfer of the authority to levy assessments as proposed is not appropriate, a listing of potential alternative methodologies or courses of action shall be provided.
- Preparation of a summary report on the above.
- LAFCO desires to have the proposed boundary change before the Commission as soon as practical; therefore, time is of the essence. Swift completion of this

project is a high priority. We are tentatively planning on having this proposal heard on December 8th. In order to keep to this schedule, the analysis would need to be completed by November 28th.

- Limited funds are available for this analysis. An appropriation of \$10,000 has been made. While it is desired that the cost be limited to this amount, responses exceeding this amount may be considered. Quotes exceeding \$15,000, however, will not be considered.

Additional background and specific information relative to the detachment proposal is attached, including the following:

- Plan of Services submitted by the City in support of its application. This includes information on existing and proposed assessment levels based on the assumption of services by the City and transfer of the authority to levy and collect the assessments.
- Correspondence from the District objecting to the detachment from the District and the proposed transfer of the assessments.
- Rebuttal correspondence from the City.

Responses must include the following:

- A description of similar or relevant analyses performed by the firm in the past, including experience working with assessment districts.
- For each component of the services requested above, the estimated cost and a not to exceed amount for that component.
- The estimated time for completion of the project from the time an agreement is executed.
- A listing and description of any past or current services performed for either the City of Menifee or the Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District, including the dates such services were performed.
- Qualifications of personnel that would be assigned to the project.
- A minimum of three relevant references.

SECTION C. PLAN OF SERVICES

BACKGROUND/INTRODUCTION

City of Menifee Overview

The City of Menifee is located in southwestern Riverside County approximately 30 miles southeast of the City of Riverside, California. The city encompasses approximately 50 square miles with an overall population of 89,004. Interstate 215 traverses north and south through the center of Menifee, with existing community commercial areas located primarily along Newport Road, Bradley Road, and McCall Boulevard off of the Interstate 215 Freeway.

The City of Menifee includes the communities of: Sun City, Quail Valley, and portions of Romoland. The city is generally bordered on the north, west, and south by the cities of: Canyon Lake, Lake Elsinore, Murrieta, Perris, and Wildomar. To the east and northeast, the city border. The area was originally inhabited by the Luiseno and Pechanga Indian tribes, and in the 1700s, the area fell under the rule of the Spanish empire. The area was eventually annexed into the United States from Mexico in 1850 under California's statehood.

Farming activity beginning in the mid-1800s was concentrated in the Menifee area. Mining activity began in the early 1880s with the discovery of a significant quartz lode by miner Luther Menifee Wilson. Menifee derived its name from that mining operation. Early development of the City of Menifee began with Sun City in the early 1960s as the concept of an active retirement community that was envisioned by Del Webb, a major building contractor from Phoenix, Arizona. Sun City is centrally located within the City of Menifee with a mix of residential and commercial activity.

The Menifee area began to grow further in 1989 with the master-planned community of Menifee Lakes and continues to be one of the fastest growing communities in California. Quail Valley is a semi-rural residential community in the northwestern section of the city, and Romoland is a residential and commercial/industrial community located in the northeastern section of the city.

Elementary and middle school education in the City of Menifee are provided by the Menifee Union School District and the Romoland School District. High school education is provided by the Perris Union High School District. The City of Menifee is also home to Mount San Jacinto Community College. The Menifee campus serves the Temecula, Murrieta, and Menifee area. Additionally, four year institution, Brandman University has a campus in the City.

On June 3, 2008, the residents of the communities encompassing the City of Menifee voted to incorporate Menifee into Riverside County's 26th city. The new City of Menifee was officially established on October 1, 2008 in to Riverside County as its 26th city.

Detachment Justification

Since incorporation, the City of Menifee has progressively improved infrastructure, public services, and accessibility for its residents. Prior to 2008, the County of Riverside provided most public services through various Community Services Areas (CSA), Lighting and Landscape Maintenance Districts (LLMD), and Community Facility Districts (CFD) special taxes. At the time of incorporation most of these special tax districts were succeeded to the City, with few exceptions. Today, additional governmental services are funded and provided to the community through the City's General Fund revenues. Consequently, most public benefit services are offered directly by City personnel including: Public Works/Engineering, Finance, Community Development and Planning, Economic Development, Administrative Services (Information Technology, Human Resources), City Council, City Manager, Code Enforcement/Building and Safety, and most recently parks and recreation through the Community Services Department. Police, Fire, and Animal services are the few functions currently provided by contract operators.

Local Agency Formation Commissions (LAFCOs) are mandated by the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Reorganization Act of 2000 (CKH) to encourage orderly development within their county of jurisdiction. The

Act governs the boundaries of special districts and cities, consistent with each agency's principal act, and further directs LAFCOs to make reorganization decisions based on multiple factors, including the need for efficient delivery of public services. For example, before granting a reorganization proposal, the CKH requires a LAFCO to consider "[t]he need for organized community services; the present cost and adequacy of governmental services and controls in the area; probable future needs for those services and controls; probable effect of the proposed incorporation, formation, annexation, or exclusion and of alternative courses of action on the cost and adequacy of services and controls in the area and adjacent areas." (Gov. Code § 56668 (b).) Similarly, the LAFCO must also consider "[t]he effect of the proposed action and of alternative actions, on adjacent areas, on mutual social and economic interests, and on the local governmental structure of the county. (Gov. Code § 56668(c).)

In accordance with these legislative mandates, the Riverside LAFCO has adopted its own Policies & Procedures to implement its mandate, i.e. to "ensure the establishment of an appropriate and logical municipal government structure for the distribution of efficient and appropriate public services." (Riverside LAFCO Policies & Procedures, p. 1.) In fact, Riverside LAFCO's Strategy 2.1.2, specifically states that where a special district's boundaries overlap city territory, the Riverside LAFCO will support detachment of the special district, where the city can demonstrate either of the following: (1) the subject city provides a higher level of service; or (2) the subject city provides equivalent service levels at a lower cost.

Furthermore, the Riverside LAFCO also states that one of its objections is to "minimize the number of agencies providing services in a given area." (Objective No. 2, Riverside LAFCO Policies & Procedures, p. 7.) To accomplish this objective, the Riverside LAFCO has indicated that it would encourage implementation of changes of organization, where the result will be "better services, reduced costs, and/or efficient administrative of services to the citizens. (Strategy 2.2.4, Riverside LAFCO Policies & Procedures, p. 8.)

Accordingly, it is the intent of the City, through this application, to demonstrate how the detachment of the Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District from the eastern portion of the City can accomplish the objectives and goals discussed above. Specifically, the City shall demonstrate through this application that the management of park and recreation services can be provided more affordably and efficiently to the residents of the impacted areas by the City, than the services that are currently being delivered by the current service provider, the Valley Wide Recreation and Park District.

Parks and Recreation Services Background

In 2013, the Menifee City Council voted to create the City's first Community Services Department, charged with delivering recreation programs and facilities to residents of the growing community. For the first year City personnel worked to improve residents' quality of life through park and landscape improvements, signature special events, and dynamic recreation programs for Menifee's youth, adults, and seniors. This was primarily accomplished with the contracted assistance of the County of Riverside Economic Development Agency (EDA). The EDA contract services had been carried over since the City's incorporation with City personnel supplementing the contract scope with event management and capital project management. The EDA responsibilities included programming and maintenance of all City owned recreation facilities.

Facilities

Upon incorporation, the City inherited 30 acres of parks and open space previously managed by the County of Riverside. This included seven parks, various trails, and over one million square feet of landscaped parkways and medians. Since then, the inventory of open space has grown with two additional public parks, miles of community trails, and more planned in the coming years. As of July 1, 2014, the City of Menifee assumed ownership of the Kay Cenicerros Senior Center, thanks to a conveyance from the County of Riverside. The majority of these facilities currently reside west of the Interstate 215 freeway, excepting one City park less than a quarter mile east of the freeway. There are additional public parks within the city that are not owned or operated by the City or the County. Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District (VWRPD) manages 20 public parks within the City of Menifee east of the Interstate 215 freeway. VWRPD has provided recreation and parks services to the residents of their 536 square mile district since 1972.

During the early growth of the Menifee Valley the services provided by VWRPD were invaluable to county residents in unincorporated areas not actively serviced by the County.

Contract Operations

In 2014 the City Council was poised to take on parks and recreation services in the City of Menifee with the non-renewal of the EDA operator contract in exchange for potential in-house operations. On April 30, 2014, the City Council held a workshop to consider whether these services should be directly provided by City staff or through a new contract with VWRPD. On May 7, 2014 the City Council directed City staff to execute an agreement with VWRPD for the operation and maintenance of the existing City owned parks and recreation facilities.

From July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015, VWRPD delivered these services to the community under contract with mixed results. The District’s original April 2014 proposal offered a full service solution for every facet of parks and recreation operations for City facilities. In August of 2014, VWRPD informed City staff that the scope of work did not include certain “supplemental” responsibilities. These included task such as irrigation repair, graffiti abatement, shelter reservations, emergency call out, and others. As a result the City Council executed a supplemental agreement with VWRPD to include these tasks. After nine months of work, the City Council determined that the quality of service was not desirable and directed staff to issue a notice of intent to not renew the contracts in July 2015.

In addition to dissatisfaction with VWRPD service, City Council cited the need to have local control over programs and facilities within its boundaries. The Council reexamined the April 2014 in-house service proposal and directed staff to move forward with a full service Community Services Department. Since July 1, 2015, the Department has been dedicated to empowering residents to become more involved in their communities through sports, physical activity, and constructive use of leisure time. Through responsible fiscal oversight, facility management, contract monitoring, inventive marketing, cutting edge recreation programming, and dynamic city-wide signature special events, the Department has been able to effectively create an identity and brand for extracurricular experiences in the City. Through December 31, 2015, City staff far exceeded the revenue and participation benchmarks set by the contractor in the previous year at the same time:

The notable increase in expenditures during City operation was due largely in part to new facilities that came on-line in the first half of 2015. These facilities did not exist in 2014. Seeing the positive response from residents and a promising return on investment, the City Council directed staff to move forward with a detachment application to the Riverside Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) on January 7, 2016. This was soon codified with the unanimous approval of Resolution No. 16-496 by the City Council on February 3, 2016 requesting that LAFCO to take proceedings for the detachment of VWRPD from within the City of Menifee. In short, the City Council desired to see the same successes achieved on the west side of the Interstate 215 freeway to be replicated on the east side of the freeway; better connecting residents with their City government and ensuring the most prudent expenditure of tax payer dollars within the City boundaries.

City Accomplishments

Since 2014, City staff has developed policies, plans, and programs to demonstrate a track record of professional parks and recreation management. More importantly, the long list of advancements and accomplishments by Community Services staff are exemplary illustrations of how City government is connecting with the community and improving the quality of life for residents. Much of this work commenced even before the City Council directed these services to be delivered by in-house staff.

Park Use Ordinance

In preparation for the transition of City parks from County contract operation to direct City operated, staff compiled a list of necessary use rules for the safe and proper management of public recreation facilities. On May 21, 2014 City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2014-146 adding Chapter 13.01 "Regulations for the Use of Public Parks" to the Municipal Code. The new code established necessary regulations for general use of park and recreation areas and provided permit provisions for certain activities in the public parks and recreation areas. Upon adoption, staff proceeded with installation of signs in all city parks to help educate the public on the rules and requirements of use. This included dog park rules, athletic field use policies, skate park rules, overnight camping and parking, and picnic shelter reservation procedures.

Community Involvement

The most effective method of connecting with the community is through open dialogue and communication. City Council and staff seized the opportunity to better listen to the parks and recreation needs of the community by establishing various citizen boards for programming and facility demands in the City. On April 16, 2014 City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2014-143 adding Chapter 2.30 to Menifee Municipal Code establishing the City's first Parks, Recreation, and Trails Commission. The Commission is charged with coordinating parks, recreation, and trails needs city-wide. As a result, the Commission advises City Council on issues related to certain open space legislation, leisure programming, and facilities in the City.

On April 2, 2014 City Council also adopted Resolution Nos. 14-361 and 14-362 establishing the City's first Youth Advisor Committee and Senior Advisory Committee, respectively. In 2013 the City Council created the Ad-hoc Committee for Menifee Senior Citizens. This group was successful in completing a comprehensive senior needs assessment survey. Survey findings revealed several opportunities for senior services and programs within the City. With the dissolution of the Ad-hoc Committee, a permanent Senior Advisory Committee was created to assist City staff and City Council in determining what services and programs will be most beneficial to senior citizens in the future.

Successful Parks and Recreation programs also depend heavily upon engaging the youth of the community. The City quickly discovered that the majority of programs previously offered by the Riverside County EDA service contract benefit pre-teen youth in the City. As the Community Services Department prepared to assume responsibility for those programs, the City Council established a permanent Youth Advisory Committee to assist City staff and City Council in determining what programs and opportunities will be most beneficial to Menifee youth in the future. Additionally, participating youth gain invaluable experience in civic operations, teambuilding, and program development. Most youth in the public school system are required to fulfill a volunteer community service obligation in their studies. This committee provides a unique opportunity for Menifee's most valuable assets to learn more about what the City is doing, how they can help, and where their voice can be heard. In 2015, the City was awarded the Ruth Vreeland Award for Engaging Youth in City Government for the Youth Advisory Committee in its first year of operation. This prestigious distinction is awarded by the California Cities Helen Putnam Award for Excellence program.

All three community boards meet on a monthly basis and are subject to Government Code 54950, the Ralph M. Brown Act of 1953. The act guarantees the public's right to attend meetings of local legislative bodies. All meetings are noticed, open to the public, and meet all posting and accountability requirements.

Fees for Services

After creation of the Community Services Department, City staff noted that several service fees that had been inherited from the County at the time of City incorporation were severely outdated. An informal survey

of fees charged for similar activities and facilities in neighboring cities revealed that rental rates and program fees needed to be reviewed and adjusted to better maximize cost recovery.

As a result, the City completed a comprehensive cost study analysis for park and recreation services in the City. The study primarily included a review of fees, including maintenance, utilities, supplies, and staffing expenditures for each operational component of the Community Services Department. Analysis revealed the hourly cost for each service/facility and amortized any depreciating values for property and both direct and indirect expenses for those services. The comparison of fees to similar services from regional municipalities assisted in selecting rates that would allow the City to be more competitive in soliciting and advertising those services to the public. As a result, on August 20, 2014 City Council adopted Resolution No. 14-391 establishing a fee schedule for recreation programs, services, and park facility use in the City of Menifee.

Park and Landscape Design Standards

Prior to 2015, the City of Menifee utilized standards and procedures adopted from the County of Riverside for the review, installation and maintenance of landscaping, both on public and private property. In addition, the City used County standards as they relate to the preservation of existing trees within the community. Unfortunately, neither the City nor County had specific standards used as park development standards. As such, those development standards did not adequately address the expectations of the community as expressed within the City's adopted General Plan. In an effort to update, streamline and bring such standards, procedures and requirements in line with the needs of the City, a new Chapter 9.86 "Park Design, Landscaping and Tree Preservation" was adopted.

Staff from Community Services and Community Development Departments determined that it would be beneficial to the community, to establish new standards and criteria for the installation and maintenance of landscaping and irrigation systems, including submission requirements, inspection procedures, plant pallets and standard drawings. On April 15, 2015, the City Council amended the Municipal Code by adopting Ordinance No. 2015-167, establishing Chapter 9.86 regulating park design, installation and maintenance of landscaping and irrigation, and tree preservation on residential and non-residential properties (public and private) within the City of Menifee.

Quimby/Mitigation

On December 17, 2014, City Council adopted two new ordinances to secure future parks and open space needs for residents as a result of new development in town. The Quimby and Mitigation Fee Act Ordinances (Ord Nos. 2014-160/161) require developers to provide park dedication and/or in-lieu fees for new residential developments in the City at a rate of five acres per 1,000 persons. Prior to the ordinances, the City had employed the County standard of three acres per 1,000 persons; missing valuable opportunities to safeguard residents' right to necessary open space as development expands.

In order for new park dedication and improvements to occur, the Quimby and Mitigation Fee Act Ordinances required developers to comply with the City General Plan's Open Space and Conservation (OSC) Element. Furthermore, the OSC Element refers to set standards for park and recreation improvements in the City, to be defined by a comprehensive "Parks and Recreation Master Plan."

Parks, Trails, Open Space and Recreation Master Plan

On March 16, 2016, the City Council approved Resolution No. 16-500 adopting the Parks, Trails, Open Space and Recreation Master Plan (PTOSRMP) as a Background Document to the City of Menifee General Plan. The study is the first of its kind for the City and provides a comprehensive review of parks and recreation facilities, programs and infrastructure throughout Menifee; regardless of ownership. The PTOSRMP included extensive community feedback through a "community needs assessment" to ensure Menifee residents' input was incorporated into the Plan's development. This was achieved through facilitating three community workshops, an online survey, a phone survey, stakeholder interviews, and sports user group questionnaires. Additionally, an extensive inventory of current facilities and programs was completed to provide a full picture of park and recreation assets and needs in the city. A notable finding of the Plan was to ensure that the future improvement and development of Menifee's parks and

trails system occur under a single umbrella, preferably with the City assuming primary and local control of all facilities and programs within the City.

The resulting document serves as a road map for future parks and recreation development, improvement, and expansion in the next ten to fifteen years. With the population rapidly increasing each year and more than 25 residential subdivision projects in some stage of the development process, it was critical that the City establish a plan to guide that growth and inform developers of what recreation amenities are in most demand by Menifee residents. The PTOSRMP is enforced by the City's Community Services Department under the advisement of the Parks, Recreation and Trails Commission.

Parks 5-Year CIP

As previously mentioned, in 2014 the City Council adopted new Park and Landscape Design Standards to set minimum criteria for ongoing maintenance and construction of public facilities. Staff has referred to these guidelines in the assessment of existing parks and compiled a list of improvement needs for the upcoming years. Collectively, each of these projects is referred to as the Parks Capital Improvement Program (CIP). Given the depth and breadth of the project list, staff has proposed a five year plan to address many of the most needed improvements and other lower priority additions to the parks system. The list of projects is the collection of field assessments, feedback from the PTOSRMP process, and industry best practices/requirements.

The CIP plan is intended to be organic and will direct the capital improvement efforts moving forward, but will remain flexible enough to allow for modifications as time progresses. For example, due to recent water restriction ordered by the Governor of California, the need for conversion of non-functional turf in parks has become a high priority project that was not being considered in the previous year. Additionally, facilities damaged by inclement weather or infrastructure failure may change the project list and priorities moving forward. Staff intends to review the listing and priorities on an annual basis to account for these changes and any new funding opportunities that may arise. On August 19, 2015, City Council approved the City's first Parks 5-year CIP and authorized over \$1 million in park improvement projects for fiscal year 2015-2016. Great progress has been made to-date with various projects nearing completion and others ready to begin, under the project management of the Community Services Department's Parks/Landscape Maintenance Superintendent.

City-wide Signature Special Events

Special events are an integral part of building community within the City of Menifee. Residents have supported past special events by turning out in large numbers to experience events including: Independence Day Celebration, Fall Festival, Christmas Tree Lighting, Movies in the Park, Menifee Better Together clean up days, Family Campout, Spring Fest, Birthday Gala, and many more. It is estimated that over 40,000 Menifee residents attend and enjoy these special events annually. These annual activities aim to **Attach** people to the community in which they live, **Attract** people and business to the growing Menifee community, and **Achieve** social and economic stimulus through increased sales tax and transient occupancy tax revenues during events.

Perhaps more important, the events are effective at delivering Creative Place Making experiences for residents. As residents make positive associations with the events and the City, they are more apt to recreate routinely at parks and other public facilities. The past two years of events have been successful mostly due to an inclusive planning committee style of event management. City staff has enlisted the support of various community groups and non-profits to co-deliver the festivities; providing more buy-in and ownership of the programs as true community events.

POLICE PROTECTION

The City of Menifee contracts with the Riverside County Sheriff to provide police service for residents. Public safety is the top priority of our city. Captain Brandon Ford is the Police Chief for the City of Menifee. The current level of service standard goal for Menifee is 1.0 officers per 1,000 residents. The target response time varies by call type. Response times by priority type are provided below for the year 2009, 2010 and 2013. Response times have increased over the last few years. At least some of this increase

could be explained by the disproportionate increase in higher priority calls. Other factors would include the increase of population and ongoing road construction.

The nearest station is the Perris office at 137 N. Perris Boulevard, Perris, CA 92570. The actual level of service being provided within the service area of Menifee is .58 officers/deputies per 1,000 residents. Approval of this detachment application will not modify the existing police protection service as the scope of public safety in the City extends to all City boundaries currently. There is no proposed change in the service provider for police protection.

FIRE PROTECTION SERVICES

The City contracts with the County of Riverside for fire protection services. In turn, the County contracts with the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CalFire). The full-service contract also provides for dispatch, emergency medical response, fire prevention and fire safety education programs. Although contract costs are generally based on stations, apparatus and personnel located within each contracting city, service is provided as part of the County Fire Department’s coordinated regional network.

Fire protection services are funded by a portion of the property tax dedicated to structural fire protection and City general funds. The general fund money makes up the difference between the structural fire property tax and the total cost of service as charged by the County. The City does not levy any additional special taxes to support fire protection and emergency services.

Units responding to an incident may be dispatched from stations either within or outside of the City. Conversely, stations located within Menifee can also respond to incidents in adjacent contract cities and unincorporated areas. Four fire stations are currently located within the City’s boundaries (see the Fire exhibit at the end of this report). The station number, approximate location and apparatus are shown in the table below. Like nearly all units in the County’s system, engine companies are staffed with three persons and truck (ladder) companies are staffed with four persons. All engines are staffed with paramedic personnel.

Riverside County Menifee Lakes Fire Station #76 is the only fire facility within the area affected by this detachment application. In addition to these stations, response may also come on a regular basis from nearby Station 54, located at 25730 Sultana's Rd. in Homeland, 92548 and Station 10, located at 105 S. F Street in Perris, 92570. Units from the City of Murrieta Fire Department could respond on a mutual aid basis.

In 2013, the County Fire Department units responded to 8,274 incidents within the City of Menifee, a 5.3 percent increase over 2012. Station 7 in Sun City was the first responder to 57 percent of the calls within the City. Over three-quarters of calls in Menifee (77 percent) are for medical aid. The next highest frequency incidents, in descending order, are public service assistance (10.2%), response to traffic collisions (5.4%) and false alarms (4.4%). Fire calls, including structure, vehicle and wildland fires, accounted for approximately 1.5 percent of calls in 2013.

The Fire Department has the following response time targets:

911 processing/dispatch: 1:20

Turnout: 1:00

Drive time: less than 5 minutes 90 percent of the time.

City-wide average first unit response time (drive time) tracked by the Fire Department for 2013 was 4.1 minutes. Just under 80 percent of the calls were responded to within five minutes. This is slightly short of the Department's target of 90 percent of responses within five minutes.

Approval of this detachment application will not modify the existing fire protection service as the scope of fire protection in the City extends to all City boundaries currently. There is no proposed change in the service provider for fire protection.

WATER SERVICES

Eastern Municipal Water District (EMWD) provides retail potable water services to Menifee, which is 47 square miles of its total 542 square mile service area. EMWD is a member agency of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD), the State Water Contractor and as such, purchases water from MWD to provide wholesale water to other water agencies, or as in the case of Menifee provide retail service to domestic customers. As of 2011, EMWD provided domestic water to an estimated 106,626 residential and agricultural customers. Existing water resources available to EMWD consist of California State Water Project, the Colorado River Aqueduct and local groundwater.

Approval of this detachment application will not modify the existing public water purveyor as there is no proposed change in the provider for these services and there is no proposed change in land use designations for the detachment area(s).

WASTEWATER SERVICES

Eastern Municipal Water District (EMWD) is the wastewater service provider within Menifee. EMWD provides wastewater collection, treatment and disposal. Within its service area, the EMWD has five regional water reclamation facilities which treat approximately 46 million gallons of wastewater every day. The wastewater treatment plants and treatment capacities are as follows:

All of the wastewater flows from Menifee; partial flows from Moreno Valley and Hemet are diverted to the Perris Valley Water Reclamation Facility. The plant serving Menifee have to the ability to provide tertiary treatment, which is the highest level of treatment that removes bacteria and viruses. Water at this level can be used for any purpose short on direct human consumption.

Approval of this detachment application will not modify the existing public wastewater treatment as there is no proposed change in the provider for these services and there is no proposed change in land use designations for the detachment area(s).

PARK AND RECREATION

On December 11, 2014, the Riverside LAFCO considered a Sphere of Influence review and amendment for VWRPD. The amendment proposed the expansion of the VWRPD boundary beyond the I-215 freeway to the far western boundary of the City of Menifee. In a unanimous vote, the Commission declined the request to increase the VWRPD territory, citing a need for the City to establish itself as a reliable service provider of park and recreation programs and facilities within its own territory. Furthermore, the Commission concurred that the natural evolution of cityhood should include the local agency gaining full control of all public facilities within its boundaries, city-wide. The Commission recommended that the City achieve critical benchmarks to demonstrate a need for detachment from VWRPD as follows:

1. City to establish its own parks and recreation operation (completed as of July 1, 2015)
2. Show a track record of performance (complete as outlined in the background/introduction)
3. Gain concurrence from City Council on desire to detach VWRPD from the City of Menifee (complete per City Council adoption of Resolution No. 16-496 on February 3, 2016)
4. Develop a plan to transition VWRPD facilities to the City (included in this Plan of Services)

A change in the Park and Recreation service provider is the primary component to be considered by the LAFCO Commission for the Detachment of VWRPD from the City of Menifee.

CURRENT SERVICE PROVIDER

Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District was formed on July 27, 1972 by a vote of the people under the provisions of Public Resource Code Section 5780 et. Seq. for the purpose of providing recreation and park services to the residents of the Hemet-San Jacinto Valley. The District is governed by a five member elected board. Each member is elected to a four year term by the electorate within the District boundaries. Traditionally, District board meetings are held monthly at the organization's headquarters in San Jacinto.

In 1985, VWRPD had only one regional park facility. Today the District operates and maintains over 80 park sites, community centers, aquatic centers, ball fields, soccer fields and tennis courts. In addition, they provide maintenance for 60 miles of streetscape. VWRPD manages this system of parks and landscaped right-of-way parkways and medians throughout their territory. Most of the District encompasses unincorporated areas of Riverside County, however there are a few cities whose boundaries are fully encompassed by VWRPD. As an exception, VWRPD's sphere of influence and District boundary overlaps 19.8% of the geographic area of the City of Menifee. Conversely, the City of Menifee represents just 1.7%, or nine square miles, of VWRPD's overall 800 square mile territory (536 square miles within special tax districts).

VWRPD is an active member of the California Association of Recreation and Park Districts (CARPD), a professional association of 64 park and recreation districts throughout California. VWRPD Board Member, Frank Gorman, is the current President of the CARPD Board of Directors. CARPD "advocates for and provides park districts the support needed to fulfill their role as providers of quality programs and facilities to their local communities".

Parks and Facilities

In 2015-16 VWRPD collected over \$3.7 million in special tax district revenue from Menifee residents to maintain parks and parkways on the City's east side. Three Lighting and Landscape Maintenance Districts

(LLMDs) overlay the east side of the City to provide funding for the maintenance and operation of the parks listed below.

Additionally, there are multiple water quality detention basins and parkway landscaped planter areas that VWRPD maintains as a component of LLMD management. At the time of City incorporation in 2008, all infrastructure facilities within the public right-of-way were dedicated to the City of Menifee. As such, all basins and parkways/streetscapes became the property of the City. Currently, 3.6 million square feet of parkways/paseos/trails and 618,297 square feet of basins are being maintained by VWRPD despite the City's ownership and ultimate legal responsibility for the public improvements. VWRPD continues to collect tax assessments to manage these facilities. Conversely, the parks within these special tax districts are owned by VWRPD as a result of residential developers' dedication to the district as a Quimby requirement over the years. These are public parks, paid for by the tax payers of the special tax districts in which they reside. Marion Ashley Park, Eller Park, and the future Wheatfield Extension are the only County owned exceptions to VWRPD ownership.

Level of Service Standard

As of December 17, 2014, the standard of service for required park acreage in the City of Menifee increased from 3 acres per thousand persons to 5 acres per thousand persons. The former standard was inherited from the County of Riverside at the time of incorporation and had been in use by the City since 2008 and by VWRPD prior to that. More importantly, the method and regulation of park dedication (and related fees) within the proposed detachment area had been facilitated by VWRPD prior to the City Council establishing its own Quimby and Mitigation ordinances, adopting its own city-wide Parks, Trails, Open Space and Recreation Master Plan, and creating its own city-wide maintenance Community Facilities District (CFD) for all new development projects.

Level of Park Services

VWRPD provides basic recreation programming from the various facilities on the east side of the City. Activities are primarily enrollment based programs delivered by third party contract organizations and instructors. These activities are conducted on sports fields and at three facilities on the City's east side. The **Menifee Community Center** and **Menifee Gymnasium** are staffed by one full time Senior Recreation Supervisor, one full time Park Coordinator, and several part time recreation aides. The **Marion V. Ashley Community Center** is staffed by one full time Recreation Supervisor and several part time Recreation Aides. The District oversight for services in Menifee occurs at the VWRPD headquarters in San Jacinto.

Contract Classes – VWRPD currently offers several fee based classes to residents. Contract class instructors are paid a percentage of the total class revenue collected from residents. Several classes are offered on a “drop in” basis in which residents may attend once or multiple times, and pay the “per class” fee each time they attend.

Landscape Maintenance – VWRPD provides general landscape maintenance for parks, trails, paseos, basins, and parkways in the detachment area through a contract landscape vendor. The District supplements contract labor with onsite staff providing troubleshooting support when and where the contract vendor is not available to respond. Typically, this function has been fulfilled by recreation staff conducting minor maintenance tasks as needed.

Interagency Agreements

Menifee Union School District - VWRPD and Menifee Union School District (MUSD) currently have a Joint Use Agreement which was established August 15, 2000. The agreement included shared costs for construction of Menifee Gymnasium. Shared maintenance cost and usage of the facility are included in the agreement as follows:

Use of the Gymnasium:

- MUSD will control the gym from 6:00am to 3:30pm Monday – Friday except holidays when it is under control of VWRPD
- VWRPD will control the gym from 3:31pm to 5:59am Monday – Friday and all day Saturday, Sunday, and holidays
- MUSD designates up to 12 days per school year for use of the gym for special night time activities by MUSD

Maintenance of Gymnasium:

- MUSD – none until VWRPD contribution to project costs equals MUSD's share; 50% (\$500,000) thereafter
- VWRPD – 100% of the costs until such time as VWRPD's total contribution to project costs equal MUSD's share; 50% thereafter

Utilities:

Utilities include electricity, gas, water, sewer, and audio visual. Trash removal costs at to be borne by MUSD, and VWRPD are to pay for their own telephone expense.

- MUSD – 50%
- VWRPD – 50%

**Additional Joint Use Agreements with Menifee School Districts; Romoland Unified, and Perris Union High School District have not yet been established.*

County of Riverside

VWRPD currently has two agreements with the County of Riverside for the management and operation of the Marion V. Ashley Park and Community Center and Eller Park located in the north east community of the City known as Romoland.

Marion V. Ashley Park and Community Center – On May 5, 2011 the County executed a Revenue Lease Agreement with VWRPD for the operation of the park and center. The lease term is for 49 years with rental payment of \$1 per year. All maintenance, improvements, and utilities are to be paid for by VWRPD. At the end of the 49 year lease term, VWRPD may acquire the premises for \$1.00. Additionally, the County consented to the sublease of day care facilities and programming on the premises to the Child Development Centers (CDC). Operation of this facility is not funded by the LLMD special tax district. It is assumed that VWRPD absorbs these costs in the District's general operating budget.

Eller Park – On March 25, 2010, the County executed a Maintenance and Operations Agreement with VWRPD to manage Eller Park. The agreement term was for five years and stipulated that the District would provide all improvements and maintenance to the premises. The County provided an option to convey the park property to the District upon completion of a “CalTrans Connection” project. To date, record of this project’s completion has not been located and the County has not executed a renewal of the Maintenance and Operations Agreement with VWRPD. Operation of this facility is not funded by the LLMD special tax district. It is assumed that VWRPD absorbs these costs in the District’s general operating budget.

Wheatfield Extension - On October 13, 2005, the County conveyed 4.73 acres of undeveloped land to VWRPD for the “sole purpose of constructing a public park” adjacent to the existing Wheatfield Park. The parcel of land at APN 364-152-034 had a restrictive deed covenant upon it stipulating that VWRPD is required to construct the park improvements within a three year period from the date of transfer. Should the District not construct the park in this time frame, the property is to revert back to the County. To date, these improvements have not been completed and by default the property is the ownership of the County.

NEW SERVICE PROVIDER

The City of Menifee proposes delivering critical parks and recreation services to residents of the impacted detachment areas through management by the City’s Community Services Department (CSD). The CSD is committed to improving the quality of life for all residents. Through people, parks, programs, Department staff offers residents a chance to connect with one another in a positive, safe, and engaging environment. From newborns to golden years - active to passive - athletic to crafty - CSD programs offer something for everyone.

The Menifee Community Services Department is an active agency member of the California Parks and Recreation Society (CPRS), the Southern California Municipal Athletic Federation (SCMAF), and the National Parks and Recreation Association (NRPA). The Department Director, Robert Lennox, is a frequent trainer and presenter at the annual CPRS Conference attended by association members from over 389 parks and recreation agencies throughout California, with 2,580 members. CPRS is the largest professional association in California supporting park and recreation agencies and members. The Department’s Community Services Supervisor, Jason Hendrix, is the serving Inland Empire SCMAF President, providing sports and recreation support to 34 agencies in Southern California.

Mission

The Community Services Department enhances residents’ quality of life by delivering quality programs, services, and facilities that create lasting positive memories for youth, adults and seniors throughout the community.

The Department is comprised of the following service areas:

- Recreation and Leisure Activities
- Senior Services
- Park and Landscape Maintenance
- Park Development/Improvement
- Community Outreach (Committees and Commission)
- Grants and Scholarships
- Special Events (signature festivals and seasonal activities)

Services are delivered by a team of qualified full time parks and recreation professionals dedicated to public service. The proposed full time staffing adjustments resulting from management of the detached territories are reflected in the figure C.2 organization chart and below:

Maintenance

Through management by six Park and Landscape Maintenance Specialists, one Supervisor, and one Superintendent, the maintenance division will provide upkeep and repair of over 300 acres of landscaped parks, trails, right-of-way/parkways, and medians. Additionally, the routine mowing, weeding, and abatement tasks are provided by a service contractor. This allows the division staff to be flexible with labor and complete repairs of many deferred maintenance items and special capital projects. Typical work order categories include:

- Graffiti Abatement
- Irrigation Repair
- Landscape Repair
- Park Equipment Repair
- Park Lighting Repair
- Restroom Repair
- Vandalism


Existing Facilities

The Departments headquarters is based out of the West Annex building on the Kay Cenicerros campus. From there, supervisory staff from all divisions oversee programming, maintenance and budgeting of the entire parks system. The headquarters also houses the planning and operations staff for the City's contract classes and signature special events. As mentioned in the Introduction, these events are designed to enhance residents' quality of life, stimulate the local economy, and create a sense of place for Menifee as a destination City. Annual events include:

- Music and Arts Festival
- Christmas Tree Lighting
- Breakfast with Santa
- Santa on Wheels
- Family Day Campout
- Fall Festival
- Independence Celebration
- Spring Fest
- Veterans Day
- Memorial Day
- Birthday Gala

Level of Service Standard

As of December 17, 2014 the standard of service for required park acreage in the City of Menifee increased from 3 acres per thousand persons to 5 acres per thousand persons. The former standard was inherited from the County of Riverside at the time of incorporation and had been in use by the City since 2008 and by VWRPD prior to that. More importantly, the method and regulation of park dedication (and related fees) within the proposed detachment area had been facilitated by VWRPD prior to the City Council establishing its own Quimby and Mitigation ordinances, adopting its own city-wide Parks, Trails, Open Space and Recreation Master Plan, and creating its own city-wide maintenance Community Facilities District (CFD) for all new development projects.

Level of Park Services (detachment areas)

In addition to the programs and services currently being provided by VWRPD, City staff propose various enhancements and supplements to various district activities.

Contract Classes - The goal of CSD will be to eliminate duplication of classes or services in order to provide the changing demographic of Menifee with the best and most diverse programming possible. Successful Core classes currently offered at the facilities mentioned in this document will remain in place. The City's Parks, Trails, Open Space and Recreation Master Plan (PTOSRMP) has identified key recreation and leisure service needs for the entire Menifee community. The PTOSRMP has identified several key needs for Menifee Residents that are not currently offered at City or VWRPD facilities. Those needs include: music/instrumental classes, youth programs, fine arts/theater and multi-generational programs. Staff proposes the following new Contract Classes for Menifee Community Center, Menifee Gym, and the Marion V. Ashley Community Center. Note that cost is an estimate as specific instructors will be recruited and costs will established based on similar industry pricing structures.

- **Total Impact (Contract Classes)** – Staff Estimate that we will connect with 1,125 residents through Tot, Youth, Adult, and Senior Sports leagues operated by City of Menifee Community Services Department Staff.

Sports Programs – Staff has identified several additional programs that will enhance the recreational sports activities offered to all ages. City CSD staff are currently active members of the Inland Empire Chapter of the Southern California Municipal Athletic Federation, with Supervisor Hendrix serving on the board as 2016 President. This professional affiliation will improve all sport programs currently offered through coach and parent trainings, uniformed rules and policies for safer gameplay, and training opportunities for staff and officials/umpires.

In addition to new programs added, City of Menifee Community Services Department staff will provide program enhancements to existing youth and adult sports programming including:

 - ✓ Added emphasis on sportsmanship (Sportsmanship trophy at end of each season)

- ✓ Coaching clinics
- Adult Softball:
 - ✓ SCMAF Certified Umpires
 - ✓ Statistics for each game (MVP at end of each season)
 - ✓ Online standings and league leaders
 - ✓ Seven day per week access to staff for questions
- Youth and Adult Futsol:

Picnic Shelters/Athletic Field Allocations – VWRPD does not currently issue permits for use of picnic shelters. This can create conflicts out in the parks as patrons often argue over use and unofficial reservation of picnic tables for family gatherings and parties. Additionally, the District is not capitalizing on opportunities to increase program revenue through rental fees and recurring maintenance of the shelters. CSD currently provides this service to residents on the west side of the City to better connect with residents and ensure safe use of facilities.

With the addition of thirteen total athletic fields CSD will be able to allocate additional space to Menifee based user groups that are currently in desperate need of field time. Listed below are leagues in which CSD currently allocates field space to.

- Menifee PONY Baseball – 704 players
- Menifee Valley Little League – 425 players
- AYSO – 1,263 players
- Menifee Travel Baseball Teams – 36 players

Total Impact (Fields & Shelters):

- *Permits (fields)* – Additional 2,050 hours allocated to youth sports organizations per season with an additional 30-40 teams utilizing field space.

- *Permits (shelters)* – Additional 208 permits for shelter/gazebo rentals for residents to reserve guaranteeing uninterrupted use and weekend staff *support*.
- *Additional revenue* – An Additional \$27,205.00 in revenue from athletic field rentals (with and without lights) and shelter rentals per year.

To achieve this, CSD would apply the existing fee schedule and use rates to the new facilities in the detachment areas as follows for Wheatfield Park, Eller Park, and Marion Ashley Fields (Consistent with current City Council approved fee schedule):

CSD currently has one staff that is responsible for making contact with residents that rent outdoor facilities. They ensure shelters/fields are clean and ready for use. The staff member also has a city issued cell phone to respond to any problems that may occur during the length of each rental.

Rentals (Indoor) – CSD will rent community rooms out to the public when they are not being utilized for city programming. Rental rates include one staff member for non-alcoholic rentals, and two staff members for rentals that will have alcohol present. Rental rates will remain consistent with City Council approved rates as listed below:

New Special Events – CSD will continue to provide the community with traditional VWRPD special events and will add special events to facilities highlighted in this document. New Special Events will include:

- Parents Night Out – During Holiday Season parents can drop their children off at the Marion V. Ashley Center so they can complete their holiday shopping! While in the care of City of Menifee Community Services Staff, participants will participate in sport competitions, watch a traditional holiday movie, participate in group games, and receive a snack.
- Teens Jam – July – Led by the Menifee Youth Advisory Committee (YAC), this collaborative program with the Southern California Teen Coalition where teens from other communities will interact with Menifee teens in a series of team building, traditional recreational activities, sports, arts & crafts, and youth development opportunities

Drop In Programs – CSD will continue to offer drop in basketball for the community as currently provided. In addition, CSD will provide several afterschool enrichment programs for youth at these times:

- Fridays – 8:30pm-10:00pm (Menifee Gymnasium)
- Saturdays – 6:30am-8:00am (Menifee Gymnasium)
- Monday – Friday – 2:30pm-4:00pm (Marion V. Ashley)

After School Enrichment Programs – The PTOSRMP identifies a community need for youth programs during the afterschool time. These include social recreation, tutoring, mentoring, and non-sport activities. CSD currently meets quarterly with Menifee Union School District Officials to prepare a joint application for ASES (After School Education and Safety) funds during the 2017/2018 school year. The ASES program would take place on site at two ASES qualifying Menifee Union School District sites. In the meantime, staff are preparing a plan to implement After School programs at a low cost for Menifee youth. Currently an after school program (After School Adventures Program – ASAP) is in operation at the Lazy Creek Recreation Center, and has been a welcome addition to residents. The current program is open to ages 6-17 years of age. The proposed ASAP program will be held at a combination of Menifee Community Center, Wheatfield Park, and the Menifee Gymnasium. The program will be available for \$20.00 per month. Activities include:

- Homework Assistance (staff available to assist)
- Enrichment activities
- Guest speakers
- Fine arts (art projects, ceramics, clay modeling)
- Performing arts (lyrical contests, musical instrument lessons)
- Physical Education (will rotate on a monthly basis)
- SPARKS (research based PE program targeting childhood obesity)
- Spike Ball (variation volleyball/4 square activity)
- Traditional Sports

***Extended care from 6:00pm-6:30pm will be available for additional fee (\$10.00 per month on an as needed basis).*

Teen Programming – Teens will be welcome to attend the ASAP program, the MET program or drop in gymnasium, however, specific times will be dedicated to teen enrichment at Wheatfield Community Center or Menifee gymnasium depending on availability. Proposed Teen specific programming will occur on the second and fourth Thursday of each month. “Teen Scene” will provide teens with a place to call home while receiving valuable information on: healthy activities, anti-bullying methods, financial aid for college, and jobs while in high school, and teen leadership in their community. Teen Scene sessions will be led by: CSD staff, as well as Youth Advisory Committee (YAC) members and industry professionals in a variety of fields.

Senior Programming – During the January 2016 Senior Advisory Committee (SAC) meeting, Committee Chair appointed a community volunteer outreach coordinator to be responsible for reaching out to Senior Specific HOA Communities. Several of these HOA communities are located near detachment area facilities. It is the goal of the SAC and CSD to provide on-site programming at these HOA facilities. Examples of programming may include:

- Senior specific health care information and free screenings
- Seminars on Senior Scams
- Senior Fitness Clubs (walking clubs, low impact cardiovascular activities)
- Senior Symposiums on transportation
- “KC Express” excursion program , trips and tours, plays and musicals
- Local fairs and museums
- Expand SAC by holding meetings, symposiums, and offering services on both sides of the freeway
- Extension of Menifee Healthy Seniors Program – part of the Valley Health Systems grant to provide low impact fitness equipment along various trails along with pedometers to be checked out of a designated facilities.

Landscape Maintenance – In June of 2015, City Council awarded contracts to landscape maintenance vendors to provide routine “mow-and-go” services in city parks, trails, and landscaped parkways. The contract was awarded for a single year with two optional single year renewals. The scope of services includes mowing, pruning, tree trimming, weeding, gopher/pest/graffiti abatement, and restroom janitorial services. City maintenance staff retained the responsibilities of irrigation repair and water management to ensure direct control over ongoing conservation efforts. This has resulted in significant savings on utility bills in the current fiscal year. Additionally, in-house staff have completed numerous capital improvement

projects included irrigation controller retrofits to reduce water use. This same model is proposed for all facilities in the detachment area. The enclosed maintenance exhibits with quantities and mapping will be used to publish a Request for Bids on the routine maintenance of east side facilities.

Interagency Agreements

As mentioned above, the CSD has been in discussions with representatives from all three schools districts in Menifee as well as the Santa Rosa Academy (SRA), a local charter school, to try and broker joint-use agreements that will be mutually beneficial to both organizations. To-date, the City has executed a joint use agreement with SRA for usage of athletic fields. SRA and CSD have discussed expanding the agreement to include usage of the gymnasium currently under construction.

The status of each potential agreement is as follows:

Menifee Union School District:

- Committee being formed to meet quarterly to discuss planned application for ASES funds for school year 2017/2018.
- Staff has designed and submitted a plan to utilize Bell Mountain Middle School for Cities Independence Day Celebration event, allowing for a larger fireworks show, and additional opportunities for residents to enjoy the day of the event
- Staff are working on a joint use agreement to utilize school district facilities for additional athletic field allocations and possible gymnasium usage at middle schools

Perris Union School District:

- Staff has met with facilities staff to propose potential usage of gymnasium at Paloma Valley High School and Heritage High School
- Staff is preparing a plan to support current ASSETS Programs at Paloma Valley and Heritage High School in the form of Youth Advisor Committee outreach and on-site program and leadership training provided by YAC board.

Romoland School District:

- Met with Superintendent and Associate Superintendent of schools to discuss potential partnership and joint use opportunities. Superintendent will work with staff to try and streamline application for school usage for the purpose of additional athletic field allocations as part of a pending joint use agreement
- Associate Superintendent will provide marketing opportunities for programs as part of the School Districts upcoming "Digital Backpack" in which students and parents will receive digital copies of all district and city related marketing pieces (flyers, pamphlets, newsletters, and announcements)
- Based on feedback from Superintendent, staff has begun preparing special events for the summer that will take place on Romoland Unified School District Facilities. Projected programs include: Movies in the Park, Youth Advisory Committee outreach to local middle and elementary schools, and possible partnerships with school district music program (music in Romoland) to provide a school wide special performance during a city special event.

Partnerships – CSD currently maintains positive partnerships with several organizations to strengthen the department's connection with residents, and delivery high quality experiences all year. Current partnerships include, but aren't limited to:

- Arts Council Menifee
- Menifee Historical Association
- SCMAF – Inland Empire – Municipal Sports Association
- CPRS – California Parks and Recreation Society

CSD will utilize the relationships with our partners to provide innovative approaches to programming at Marion V. Ashley, Wheatfield Park, Menifee Gym, and Menifee Community Center.

ELECTRICITY

The current electricity utility service provider within the City of Menifee is Southern California Edison. Approval of this detachment application will not modify the existing electricity service and there is no proposed change in the service provider for electrical utilities.

LIBRARY SERVICES

The Riverside County Library System (RCLS) provides library services within the City of Menifee. Currently, there are three County library branches within Menifee. The Paloma Valley Branch Library, located at 31375 Bradley Rd., is staffed by 2.5 equivalent full-time personnel. The library is open an average of 30 hours per week and is closed Fridays and Sundays. The square footage of the facility is 5,265 ft. Approximately 15,000 volumes are held within the branch. There are various activities hosted at this site including preschool story time, crafts, a chess club, tutoring, a summer reading program and special family events. The Sun City Branch Library is located at 26982 Cherry Hills and Bradley Rd., a few miles north of Paloma Valley (see Libraries exhibit at the end of this report). The Sun City branch is open seven days per week for an average of 50 hours. The facility is approximately 11,000 square feet and employs 7.95 full-time equivalent personnel. An estimated 50,000 volumes are held at this facility. Lastly, the Romoland Library is located at 26000 Briggs Rd. at Heritage High School. RCLS provides library services at this facility through a joint use agreement. During school hours, the library is restricted to the school's use. After school hours and Saturdays, the library is open to the general public. The branch is open six days for an average of 20 hours per week. The Romoland Library facility is estimated at 3,000 square feet consisting of approximately 5,000 book volumes. The library is staffed by four time part-time personnel. Programs held at the library consist of family, child and teen programs. Several other activities such as crafts and programs like Books to Movie are available at the Romoland Library.

Approval of this detachment application will not modify the existing library services as there is no proposed change in the provider for these services for the detachment area(s).

SOLID WASTE COLLECTION

Solid waste collection and disposal services are provided by Waste Management, Inc. Approval of this detachment application will not modify the existing solid waste collection as there is no proposed change in the provider for these services for the detachment area(s).

STREET MAINTENANCE

In 2010, the City contracted out for the development of the Pavement Management System Plan to assess the existing surface condition of each individual pavement segment throughout the City.

Based on the evaluation of the surface condition report that was published in December 2011, a Pavement Condition Index (PCI) was calculated for each segment to reflect overall pavement condition. The PCI system is a rating mechanism used to describe the condition of the City's pavement and has been adopted as the nation's standard rating system by American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO) and American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM). Ranging between "0" and "100," a PCI of "0" would correspond to a badly deteriorated pavement with virtually no remaining life, while a PCI of "100" would correspond to pavement with proper engineering design and construction at the beginning of its life cycle.

The overall condition of the City of Menifee's road network, is "Very Good," with an average Pavement Condition Index of 83, with 100 being a brand new street and 0 being a badly deteriorated street with virtually no remaining life. "Very Good" has a PCI Range of 71-85 with little distress, with the exception of utility patches in good condition, or slight hairline cracks; may be slightly weathered.

The City has a five-year Capital Improvement Program (CIP) plan to deliver six key projects to improve traffic circulation. The total cost of these six projects is estimated to be \$69 million, a significant investment in Menifee's infrastructure. The funding will come from projected restricted revenue accounts outside the City's general fund.

The City implemented a "Local Improvement District (LID) Program". The purpose of the program is to identify and create a methodology to pave and maintain dirt roads. Throughout the City of Menifee, numerous residential dirt roads, some city maintained and some privately owned and maintained, exist. Some of these roads have become impassable during weather related events and are in need of repair.

While the City maintains some dirt roads that it acquired through incorporation, many other dirt roads are privately owned and not maintained by the City. It is the intent of the City to design and develop a program to assist owners of privately owned dirt roads to design, improve and pave them to city standards. Once the roads have been improved and accepted by the City, the City would maintain them in perpetuity.

All city rights-of-ways are maintained by in-house city staff as of 2015. The Public Works Department, through its street maintenance division, are responsible for the ongoing upkeep of all streets and sidewalks in the city. Approval of this detachment application will not modify the existing street maintenance as there is no proposed change in the provider for these services for the detachment area(s).

LIGHTING/LANDSCAPING/STREET SWEEPING

The City of Menifee's Street Lighting, Landscape Maintenance, and Street Sweeping services are primarily delivered through staff management of various special tax district revenues. These tax areas include the following districts with services varying for each and managed by the City, VWRPD, or the County of Riverside. For the purposes of this detachment application, landscaping service in the subject detachment areas (in addition to parks and recreation) is the only service proposed for transition from current provider VWRPD, to new service provider, City of Menifee. All existing City and County services are to remain unchanged as a result of this detachment.

CURRENT SERVICE PROVIDER

Street Lighting

The City provides street lighting pays the electric utility bill to Southern California Edison. Riverside County Economic Development Agency (EDA) was previously administering the street lighting covered under the County Services Areas (CSAs).

Street Sweeping

The City and County reports that street sweeping services is still being administered and performed by the County through CSA 152 in the City of Menifee. CSA 152 is maintained and operated by the County of Riverside and the City continues to be part of this service. The City did not detach from CSA 152 at the time of incorporation. EDA continues street sweeping what was annexed into CSA 152 prior to incorporation, however EDA, cannot annex anything new into CSA 152 for street sweeping in Menifee. Street sweeping services are provided on a bi-weekly basis.

Landscaping

Operation and maintenance of various right-of-way parkways, planters and medians are currently provided by both VWRPD and the City of Menifee. Services include routine irrigation repair, grounds upkeep, weed abatement, and replanting as needed. Upon incorporation, all public rights-of-ways were conveyed to the City from the County. During the changeover in 2008, administration and maintenance of ROW landscaping in three special tax districts did not transition to the City, despite the City being the new legal owners of the facilities: LLMD 88-1 (Original/Parks), LLMD Menifee South, and LLMD Menifee North. This has resulted in confusion over jurisdiction on maintenance and construction standards, improvement plan review, and timing on the acceptance of newly dedicated ROW landscaping. Furthermore, all liability for the ongoing condition of these areas rests with the owner, the City of Menifee.

NEW SERVICE PROVIDER

Landscaping of the public right-of-ways are proposed for detachment from the existing VWRPD LLMDs. As a result, the City would become the new service provider for the activities and facilities. Again, all public right-of-ways are currently property of the City of Menifee and a decision to grant detachment for these improvements will properly align ownership with maintenance and tax administration responsibilities. Services provided would be identical but with local oversight of daily operations and financial accounting done by City staff. As a result, the City's management of the detached areas can achieve an overall savings of 2% to Menifee tax payers across all districts.

Currently, maintenance of these areas is delivered through a private landscape vendor hired by VWRPD to complete all facets of parkway upkeep. Conversely, the City's approach to maintenance of all zones would include three in-house Park/Landscape Maintenance Specialists to perform irrigation repair, conduct inspections, and complete special improvement projects in the districts; in addition to a general landscape contractor for routine maintenance. The aggregate lower cost of service saves approximately \$70,000 each year to tax payers while still maintaining a healthy reserve and contingency allocation of more than \$300,000 annually. Additionally, the City model provides for a \$23/lot or dwelling unit assessment to accommodate anticipated tree maintenance costs each year (10,620 lots and \$244,266). Tree maintenance is implied in the scope of landscape maintenance, however the VWRPD's current plan of service does not clearly portray the ongoing and annual upkeep of right-of-way trees. This would likely be an added benefit to detachment and local City management.

Pursuant to the State Water Control Resources Board, the Municipal Storm Water Permitting Program regulates storm water discharges from municipal separate storm sewer systems (MS4s). Storm water is runoff from rain or snow melt that runs off surfaces such as rooftops, paved streets, highways or parking lots and can carry with it pollutants such as: oil, pesticides, herbicides, sediment, trash, bacteria and metals. The runoff can then drain directly into a local stream, lake or bay. Often, the runoff drains into storm drains which eventually drain untreated into a local waterbody. State Water Resources Control Board issued a General Permit for the Discharge of Storm Water from Small MS4s (WQ Order No. 2003-0005-DWQ) to provide permit coverage for smaller municipalities (population less than 100,000), including non-traditional Small MS4s, which are facilities such as military bases, public campuses, prison and hospital complexes. The City of Menifee holds the MS4 permit for management of all water detention basins within the City boundaries (excluding those operated by Riverside County Flood Control). VWRPD does not currently hold an MS4 permit to oversee such basins, but is currently providing maintenance of the facilities regardless.

Based on the current enrollments and quantities of improvements in each zone, the following rates for services are estimated for City management of all landscaping in the detachment areas:

ANIMAL SHELTER/CONTROL

Menifee currently contracts with the Riverside County Department of Animal Services for animal sheltering and the Animal Friends of the Valley (AFV) for animal (field) control services. Dog licensing is provided by AFV and costs are set by the City's cost of the service study, which was completed in April of 2012. There are one to three year licensing options; late fees are applicable for any license renewal lapses. In addition the City offers kennel licenses from one to two years. Within the City limits a maximum of four dogs or four cats are allowed per household. Approval of this detachment application will not modify the existing animal shelter/control as there is no proposed change in the provider for these services for the detachment area(s).

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

CURRENT SERVICE PROVIDER

VWRPD is funded by four sources of revenue: Property tax, program fees, LMD assessments, and grants. Property tax and LMD benefit assessments cover the cost of administration, maintenance, acquisition, capital improvements, debt payments (Certificates of Participation), utilities and operations. Program fees cover the cost of programs and are self-sustaining. Grant funds are for specific purposes and can only be used for their intended award purpose.

The detachment areas are funded by three distinct special tax districts (Landscape Maintenance Districts - LMDs) to cover all costs associated with the management and operation of public open space improvements within the City of Menifee. According to tax enrollment data, the following table represents the operating revenue and expenditures for all three tax districts for FY15-16:

The maintenance and operation of Eller Park and the Marion V. Ashley Community Center/Park are not funded by the aforementioned LLMDs but rather assumed to be supported by VWRPD’s general fund operating budget. City staff has verified that neither facility has been annexed into any of the LLMD zones and as such, should not be supported by them. In VWRPD documents the center is listed to be operated at the “sole cost and expense of the District” and the park will be funded through fees collected for services and program. As mentioned previously, both facilities are currently owned by the County of Riverside and under operatorship by VWRPD via lease and maintenance agreements.

Reserves

Proper fiscal management of special tax district funds requires the set-aside of reserve and contingency on an annual basis in the amount equal to 10% of the annual operating expenditures. According to VWRPD’s 2015 Audit Report, the fund balances (as of June 30, 2015) for each of the three districts within the City of Menifee are represented as follows:

City staff has requested from VWRPD a more detailed accounting of reserve balances for each district by Zone as required by state law, however it has not been furnished. Additionally, the Audit Report does not clearly publish the annual set aside for reserve and contingency, but rather only the aggregate current fund balance. As such, the City is not able to determine if the prescribed 10% savings by zone is occurring.

NEW SERVICE PROVIDER

The City of Menifee adopts an annual budget, the latest covering Fiscal Year 15-16. The Budget is posted on the City’s website: <https://www.cityofmenifee.us/110/Financial-Reports>. In order to fund the maintenance of the proposed detachment areas described in this application, The City proposes taking over the annual assessments of properties in each of the three districts currently managed by VWRPD, with the following actions:

As mentioned, the City is prepared to deliver the same services to Menifee residents in the affected areas at a cost two percent lower than the current provider.

With the dissolution of the Regional Facilities assessment within City boundaries, Menifee's residents would realize an additional savings of \$60,772, discounted from their annual property tax bill. As a result, these parcel owners would no longer be entitled to use of regional facilities throughout the rest of VWRPD's.

General Fund/City-wide CFD 2015-2

Because Eller Park and the Marion V. Ashely Community Center/Park are not funded by any of the VWRPD LLMDs, the City proposes supporting these facilities with funds already administered by the City. The City's General Fund is supported by property tax, sales tax and other miscellaneous revenue. As the City grows, the General Fund also grows with more revenues received each year from new residents, businesses and visitors. Additionally, in 2015 the Menifee City Council adopted and approved the establishment of Community Facilities District (CFD) 2015-2 for the maintenance of various public facilities city-wide. Both Eller Park and the Ashley Center can be supported by revenues from both funds with operating costs as detailed in Figure C.6. Following detachment determination, City staff will seek to transfer the maintenance and lease agreements with the County of Riverside, from VWRPD to the City.

Transition

City staff has made several attempts to meet with VWRPD to discuss financial information, propose transition timing, operations logistics, facility conditions, and maintenance standards. Unfortunately, each invitation has been declined by VWRPD staff. Additionally, City staff has submitted multiple Public Records Act Requests to VWRPD to retrieve pertinent tax and district maintenance information. While the request did yield some content, several items are still outstanding as listed in Figure C.7. As such, the City and its tax administration consultant have derived the operations and financial plan for the transition of the subject properties utilizing annexation and formation documents, engineers reports, tract maps, GIS mapping, and tax records. Upon detachment, additional engineering work will commence to determine exact quantity records and maintenance boundaries for all zones and facilities in the detachment areas. The City anticipates the full transition of these areas to take approximately 6 months from the time of detachment determination by LAFCO.

The Valley-Wide Recreation & Park District (“Valley-Wide”) submits this letter commenting on the above referenced application submitted by the City of Menifee (“City”) in which the City requests Riverside Local Agency Formation Commission (“LAFCO”) to approve the detachment¹ of the City from the boundaries of Valley-Wide (the “Application”).

As is set out in more detail below, Valley-Wide formally objects to the detachment based on major legal and fiscal concerns, as well as practical considerations. In brief, the underlying assumptions set out in the Application by the City regarding the proposed transfer of funding from Valley-Wide to the City are legally impermissible under the California Constitution, and therefore the proposed detachment is not fiscally feasible. This letter also includes additional information to correct false and/or factually inaccurate statements and allegations replete within the City’s Application.

I. Legal and Fiscal Concerns

A. Background

Valley-Wide, as it has for the last 44 years, administers: park facilities, provides recreation services, including recreation program services, maintains parks, medians/parkway landscaping, recreational facilities; and manages Capital Improvement and Maintenance Plans for the benefit of the residents of western Riverside County. Pursuant to the “Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972”² (the “1972 Act”), Valley-Wide formed six landscape maintenance

districts, including zones and subzones therein, to operate and maintain parks and streetscapes located within Valley-Wide's boundaries. Four of the Valley-Wide landscape maintenance districts ("LMDs") were formed within the unincorporated territory of Riverside County that later became the City. Those LMDs are the Menifee North Landscape Maintenance District ("Menifee North LMD"), the Menifee Parks Landscape Maintenance District No. 88-1 ("Menifee Parks LMD"), the Menifee South Landscape Maintenance District ("Menifee South LMD"), and the Landscape Maintenance District No. 88-1 ("LMD No. 88-1").

The City was incorporated on October 1, 2008. The Menifee Parks LMD includes parcels located solely within the boundaries of the City; the Menifee North LMD, the Menifee South LMD, and the LMD No. 88-1 include parcels located both inside and outside the boundaries of the City. When the City incorporated, LAFCO determined that Valley-Wide parks and streetscape located in the City's boundaries would continue to be owned, operated and maintained by Valley-Wide and funded through the levy of assessments imposed on parcels located within the LMDs.

In its Application, the City requests that LAFCO approve the detachment of its territory from Valley-Wide's boundaries, and take over the ownership, operation and maintenance of Valley-Wide's parks and streetscape that are located within the City's boundaries. The City intends to pay for the provision of the proposed parks and streetscape services by assuming the authority to levy and collect the assessments on parcels located within those portions of the LMDs located within the City's boundaries. Specifically, the Application expressly states that the "City proposes taking over the annual assessments of properties in [the various LMDs] currently managed by VWPRD." (Application, p. 41.) The City's Application further purports to demonstrate the City's proposed provision of the parks and streetscape services at a cost lower than the cost of services currently provided by Valley-Wide.

However, the fiscal viability for the City's proposed detachment is based on a legally impermissible premise—that LAFCO is able to transfer to the City the authority to levy and collect the assessments currently imposed on the properties that are located within the City and the LMDs. Typically, LAFCO has the power to impose terms and conditions on a detachment approval, transferring the authority to levy and collect previously authorized assessments by one local agency to another local agency. (Cal. Gov't Code, § 56886(t).) However, in this instance, and as the City should know, the detachment and transfer of assessment levy and collection authority from Valley-Wide to the City will result in anomalies that are problematic under, and a violation of, Article XIII D, section 4(a) of the California Constitution, more commonly known as Proposition 218. As a result, if it were to approve the detachment proposed by the City, LAFCO cannot, without undermining the validity of the assessments currently imposed, impose a term and condition transferring the authority to levy and collect the assessments within those portions of the LMDs within the City, from Valley-Wide to the City.

B. The Transfer of Funding Proposed by the City in the Application would Violate Proposition 218.

On November 5, 1996, California voters approved Proposition 218, the so-called "Right to Vote on Taxes Act." Proposition 218 amended the California Constitution by adding articles XIII C and XIII D. Among other changes, Article XIII D, section 4 established new procedural requirements for levying assessments, and placed substantive limitations on the use of the revenues collected from assessments and the amount of the assessment that may be imposed on any parcel. Beginning July 1, 1997, with a few limited exceptions, all existing,³ new, or increased assessments must comply with the substantive limitations and procedural requirements of Article XIII D, section 4, including the requirement that public agencies must hold a public hearing and provide property owners with an opportunity to protest any proposed new assessment or increase to an existing assessment.

Assessments imposed pursuant to the Act must comply with the substantive provisions of Article XIII D. Of significance here is that the proposed detachment of the City from Valley-Wide will result in properties that are located within the City and have been determined to receive special benefits from the improvements and services provided within LMD No. 88-1, Menifee North LMD and Menifee South LMD, no longer being subject to the levy of assessments by Valley-Wide within these LMDs. Article XIII D, section 4(a) specifically requires that an agency proposing to levy an assessment "*all parcels which will have a special benefit conferred upon them and upon which an assessment will be imposed. The proportionate special benefit derived by each identified parcel shall be determined in relationship to the entirety of . . . the maintenance and operation expenses of a public improvement No assessment shall be imposed on any parcel which exceeds the reasonable cost of the proportional special benefit conferred on that parcel.*" (Cal. Const. art. XIII D, § 4(a) (emphasis added).) As a consequence of the detachment, these parcels that will be subject to the levy of assessments within remaining territory of LMD No. 88-1, the Menifee North LMD and Menifee South LMD located in Valley-Wide will be subsidizing the special benefits enjoyed by the properties detached from these LMDs then located solely within in the City. Such an arrangement violates the proportionality requirement of Article XIII D, section 6(a).

Similarly, if LAFCO were to transfer to the City, the authority to levy and collect assessments previously levied and collected by Valley-Wide, from portions of the LMDs detached from Valley-Wide, the same results are achieved. If the City is detached from the LMDs, by necessity, properties located within the City and the LMD No. 88-1, Menifee North LMD and the Menifee South LMD will effectively be subsidizing the special benefits enjoyed by the properties located outside the City's boundaries but within the boundaries of the LMDs remaining within Valley-Wide. As a consequence, if the City were to impose the assessments within the LMDs, these assessments would violate the proportionality requirements of Article XIII D, section 4(a).

Based on the forgoing, if LAFCO authorizes the detachment of the City from the Valley-Wide, it may not, without a resulting violation of the California Constitution, impose a term or condition on the detachment authorizing the extension or continuation of the assessments by the

City on properties located in the LMDs. This term or condition would be prohibited because any such assessments would violate the substantive requirements of Article XIII D, section 4(a).

C. **LAFCO has an Obligation to Ensure the Proposed Detachment is Fiscally Feasible.**

When it adopted the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000, (Government Code section 56000 et seq.) (the “Act”), the Legislature vested LAFCOs with the sole and exclusive authority to approve changes or organizations of local agencies, including detachment of territory from special districts. (Cal. Gov’t Code, §§ 56100, 56375(a)(1).) LAFCOs are charged with, among other things, “encouraging the orderly formation and development of local agencies based upon local conditions and circumstances.” (Cal. Gov’t Code, §§ 56301.) Further, when reviewing a proposal, a LAFCO is also, among other things, required to consider whether the entity receiving the authority to provide services that are the subject of a proposal has sufficient revenues for those services following the proposed change of organization. (Cal. Gov’t Code, § 56668(k).) The need for a change of organization or reorganization to be supported by sufficient revenues—that is the need for the proposed change to be fiscally viable is a theme throughout the Act. The plan for services that is required to accompany proposals submitted to LAFCO must include certain specified information, including information on how services that are the subject of a proposal will be financed. (Cal. Gov’t Code, § 56653(b)(5).)

Riverside LAFCO, pursuant to its authority under the Act, has adopted Policies and Procedures, many of which properly focus on the financial feasibility of proposals submitted to LAFCO for its review.

- Section 2.1.2 of LAFCO’s Policies and Procedures, which is set out under Objective No. 1⁴ of Goal No. 2,⁵ pertains to situations where the boundaries of a special district overlap city territory. Goal No. 2 is to “Enhance service provision through local government structure.” With regard to special district boundary overlap of city boundaries, Section 2.1.2 provides as follows:

Where special district boundaries overlap city territory, LAFCO will support district detachments if the city provides similar services to the district and can demonstrate one of the following conditions is met:

- a. The subject city provides a higher level of service.
- b. The subject city provides equivalent service levels at a lower cost.

- Section 3.1.3 of LAFCO's Policies and Procedures⁶ provides that when a proposal will "cause a significant negative fiscal impact upon another jurisdiction, the annexing agency shall contact the affected jurisdiction prior to submittal of the application to discuss potential mitigation." Here while the City is not truly an "annexing agency" under its proposed detachment, because it is seeking to assume the services previously provided by Valley-Wide, it is in the nature of an "annexing agency."
- Section 3.1.4 of LAFCO's Policies and Procedures⁷ emphasizes the strong LAFCO preference that cities and districts with overlapping boundaries "jointly plan and coordinate capital improvements. . . to achieve orderly transition of services, to maximize the effective use of public funds, and to avoid unnecessary duplication of services."

This concept of fiscal viability, the need for coordination, collaboration and cooperation is a constant theme in LAFCO's Policies and Procedures.

1. **The City's Application is Not Fiscally Viable without the Transfer of the Authority to Levy and Collect Valley-Wide's Previously Authorized Assessments.**

As explained above, the City's proposed detachment from Valley-Wide is not fiscally viable without the ability of the City to levy and collect the Valley-Wide assessments from parcels located within the City's boundaries. Without the funding, the City cannot meet the requirements of Section 2.1.2 of LAFCO's Policies and Procedures. Specifically, the City can neither demonstrate that it can provide similar services to Valley-Wide at a higher level of service nor that it can provide equivalent service levels at a lower cost. It would be at odds with the intent behind, and the requirements of, the Act to transfer to the City the obligation and responsibility to provide the services without the necessary funding to support the services. In this instance, with the knowledge that more and more cities facing the realistic possibility of potential disincorporation due to fiscal inability to provide basic city services, LAFCO should not approve the detachment. Indeed, the City is currently seeking voter approval to increase its sales tax in order to provide general municipal services. Specifically, the resolution adopted by the City Council calling for the election cited, among other reasons for the increased tax, to prevent cuts to senior, disabled, and youth programs. (See City of Menifee Resolution 16-554.) In addition to the above concerns, Valley-Wide does not believe that the proposed detachment is in the best interests of either the City or Valley-Wide, and more importantly, the residents and taxpayers served within the LMDs.

This legal impediment to the fiscal viability of the City's proposed detachment could have been easily addressed well in advance of the City's submission of its Application to LAFCO if the City had met with Valley-Wide prior to submitting the Application, as was encouraged by LAFCO and offered by Valley-Wide on numerous occasions. Had meetings between Valley-Wide and the City occurred, Valley-Wide could have corrected the City's cost assumptions which assumptions the City has conveniently used support its assertions that it can provide the same or better services at a cost less than Valley-Wide.⁸

While Valley-Wide was aware that the City was working on completing the Application, it was surprised that the City submitted the Application without having first met with Valley-Wide officials regarding the content of the Application. Contrary to the numerous statements set out in the Application, Valley-Wide, through various communications with City officials in the months of February and March 2016, offered to assist the City with compiling complete and accurate information for use in its Application. The last such offer to assist the City (an offer by Valley-Wide to host a meeting with City staff to review draft application documents) was sent in late March, to which Valley-Wide received no response. This lack of willingness of the City to coordinate with Valley-Wide as the long-time provider of services to the territory subject to the Application is not only more than curious, but also contrary to LAFCO's above-referenced Policies and Procedures.

II. CORRECTION OF FALSE STATEMENTS AND ALLEGATIONS IN THE CITY'S APPLICATION DOCUMENTS.

As stated at the beginning of our letter, Valley-Wide believes that it is important to correct false statements and allegations included by the City in its Application. To this end, Valley-Wide submits with its letter a table correcting numerous items put forward by the City. (See Exhibit "A.") However, because they either malign Valley-Wide's reputation and/or illustrate the poor grasp the City has of the services provided by Valley-Wide within the City, Valley-Wide believes that some of the false statements and allegations included in the City's Application need special attention. These more egregious falsehoods and/or inaccuracies are discussed in detail below.

A. Valley-Wide's Operation of Detention Basins is Legally Compliant

The Application presents two inaccurate positions relating to the City's and Valley-Wide's obligation to manage storm water flows. First, it improperly states that the City "holds the MS4 permit for management of all water detention basins within the City boundaries (excluding those operated by Riverside County Flood Control)." (Application, p. 40.) Second, the Application states that Valley-Wide manages detention basins without a required MS4, or municipal separate storm sewer system, permit—leaving the impression that Valley-Wide is somehow operating detention basins illegally. Neither of these representations is correct. The City does not hold an MS4 permit to manage all water detention basins within the City

boundaries. Valley-Wide's detention basins are not an MS4 and are not currently subject to direct regulation by an MS4 permit.

1. The City does not hold an MS4 permit to manage all water detention basins within the City boundaries.

The Application asserts that the City "holds the MS4 permit for management of all water detention basins within the City boundaries (excluding those operated by Riverside County Flood Control)." (Application, p. 40.) This is inaccurate and the City should be well aware that this is not the case. The City's MS4 permit(s) only require the City to manage City-owned detention basins. Entities such as home owners associations ("HOA"), commercial and industrial developments, and schools construct, own and maintain storm water detention and retention basins, as does Valley-Wide. Valley-Wide owns and maintains approximately 24 basins. There are approximately 11 HOA-owned basins within the City's boundaries, some of which Valley-Wide maintains. As the City should know, its MS4 permit(s) do not require the City to manage the basins owned by third parties. Instead, the City's MS4 permit requires the City to directly manage any basins which it owns and to control indirectly, through enforcement of its ordinances, issuance of permits, and other police powers, basins owned and controlled by others. (See, e.g., Santa Ana Regional Water Quality Control Board Order No. R8-2010-0033, Provision B.2 [requiring the City to maintain adequate legal authority to control the contribution of pollutants into the City's MS4, inspect and maintain the City's MS4, and exercise its police power to regulate development within the City such that the development controls pollutants entering the City's MS4].) In this way, Valley-Wide is no different from an HOA, school district, or commercial or industrial development that has basins on its property. Stated simply, the City has no duty to manage property owned by Valley-Wide.

2. Valley-Wide's detention basins are not an MS4 and are not subject to direct regulation by an MS4 permit.

The Application states that Valley-Wide manages detention basins without a required MS4 permit and implies that Valley-Wide's operation is not in accordance with legal requirements. This implication is improper for two reasons: (1) Valley-Wide's detention basins are not an MS4; and (2) even if Valley-Wide's detention basins could be considered an MS4, the basins are not currently subject to NPDES permitting requirements.

First, and as the City should know and understand, Valley-Wide's basins do not fall within the Clean Water Act's definition of an MS4. An MS4 is:

a conveyance or system of conveyances (including roads with drainage systems, municipal streets, catch basins, curbs, gutters, ditches, man-made channels, or storm drains):

- (i) Owned or operated by a State, city, town, borough, county, parish, district, association, or other public body (created by or pursuant to State law) having jurisdiction over

disposal of sewage, industrial wastes, storm water, or other wastes, including special districts under State law such as a sewer district, flood control district or drainage district, or similar entity, or an Indian tribe or an authorized Indian tribal organization, or a designated and approved management agency under section 208 of the CWA that discharges to waters of the United States;

- (ii) Designed or used for collecting or conveying storm water;
- (iii) Which is not a combined sewer; and
- (iv) Which is not part of a Publicly Owned Treatment Works (POTW) as defined at 40 CFR 122.2.

(40 C.F.R. 122.2(b)(8).) Valley-Wide's detention basins are not a "conveyance or system of conveyances" for purposes of the NPDES permitting program. Because the basins do not fall within the definition of an "MS4," Valley-Wide is not currently required to obtain a permit for their operation.

Second, even if the basins could be considered an MS4, Valley-Wide has not been designated for coverage under an MS4 permit, which means that Valley-Wide is authorized to manage its basins without a permit. The MS4 permitting program is divided into large systems (40 C.F.R. 122.2(b)(4)), medium systems (40 C.F.R. 122.2(b)(7)), and small systems (40 C.F.R. 122.2(b)(16)). Only large, medium, and certain designated small MS4s must obtain an MS4 permit. The basins do not fall within the definition of a large, medium or small MS4. The State Water Resources Control Board ("State Board") and Regional Water Quality Control Boards ("Regional Board") may designate hospitals, prisons, military bases and similar entities as "non-traditional" small MS4s. (See State Water Resources Control Board Order No. 2013.0001-DWQ.) Neither the State Board nor any Regional Board has designated VWRPD as a non-traditional small MS4 or required Valley-Wide to obtain a permit for its basins. Again, this means that Valley-Wide is legally authorized to manage its basins without a permit.

All the above said, the lack of a permit, however, does not mean that Valley-Wide neglects its basins. To the contrary, Valley-Wide strives to maintain all of its facilities in accordance with applicable laws and regulations and undertakes best management practices to protect the region's water quality in accordance with the requirements of state law.

B. Statements Implying that Valley-Wide's Services Are Somehow Suspect or Subpar

We find it sad and alarming that the City—a fellow public agency—would feel that the best way to support its Application to take over the services currently provided by Valley-Wide is by maligning Valley-Wide. The following discussion highlights some of these instances and provides additional information to correct the inaccuracies.

1. Contract between the City and Valley-Wide for Services

In several instances, the Application makes reference to services Valley-Wide provided to the City under contract, indicating that the services were somehow not up to par. Contrary to the City's allegations that it was not satisfied with the parks and recreation services provided by Valley-Wide from July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015, Valley-Wide did not receive any correction notices from the City as would have been expected or would have been required by the terms of the agreement between the City and Valley-Wide. While Valley-Wide did receive email correspondence from City staff with requests for additional work or reports of equipment/facility repair, correspondence of this type is considered routine in nature. For example, if maintenance is scheduled by contract for Monday, Wednesday and Friday, an email might be received on Tuesday afternoon informing Valley-Wide of a broken sprinkler or trash at a park.

Further, although the City claims to have been surprised to learn that certain activities were not included within Valley-Wide's contracted for scope of work, the City knew that Valley-Wide's proposal for services on the West side of the City was to replicate services currently being provided on the East side. In fact, City staff and the City Council had received documentation and copies of the Valley-Wide's landscape maintenance contracts prior to a community workshop at City Hall. During the service contract review at a May 2014 meeting at City Hall, City staff was informed of all that the contract scope of work would include. City staff was aware that "supplemental" work was not included and nevertheless an agreement for supplemental work was approved. The "supplemental agreement" executed in August was added at the request of City staff because the City was requesting extra work to be done at various facilities. (See Exhibit "B" List of Extra Work Requested by the City.)

The City's Application also asserts that the City Council directed staff to not renew the contract effective on July 1, 2015. However, the District has no records of any City Council open session action on this issue prior to receiving notice of Non-renewal on April 2, 2015. This is concerning from a transparency standpoint.⁹ As related to the above referenced statements the City included in its Application, either the City is unable to review proposals and/or contract

⁹ Valley-Wide submitted a request for records under the provisions of the California Public Records Act on August 5, 2016. Except for a few documents received by the District on August 16, 2016, as related to only one of 18 categories of records, Valley-Wide has yet to receive the bulk documents responsive to its request. The August 16, 2016 communication from the City, is the last and most recent communication regarding the request. One of the categories of records Valley-Wide requested from the City is as follows:

Any and all records related to or supporting the City's statement on page 15 of the Detachment Application pertaining to the City Council's direction to staff "to issue a notice of intent to not renew the [City/VWRPD] contracts in July 2015," including the minutes of any City Council provided this direction or took action directing staff to issue a notice of intent not to renew.

scopes of work, or the City believes that conjuring up a specter of service concerns is the best way to support its Application.

2. Statements Regarding Valley-Wide's Operations.

Dappled throughout the City's Application are statements purporting to call into question the manner in which Valley-Wide operates, without any support for the statement. A couple of examples include:

- **Picnic Shelter/ Gazebo Permits and Use Fees:** City alleges that Valley-Wide's failure to issue permits to use picnic shelters/ gazebos somehow creates conflicts for park patrons and also is a missed opportunity to increase program revenue through rental fees. With all due respect to a City that has existed for less than a decade and its Community Services Department established within the last three years, the City's speculation that Valley-Wide's practice not to issue permits for picnic shelters could create conflicts between park patrons is not supported by the facts. Valley-Wide has not encountered any issues such as conflicts between park patrons presented by the current operating procedures. Additionally, Valley-Wide staff has determined that the cost of staffing and supervising reservations for the amenity would far exceed the revenue.
- **Tree Maintenance Plan:** Despite the City's allegations that the Valley-Wide's plan of service does not specifically include ongoing maintenance of trees, tree maintenance is performed by Valley-Wide on an as needed basis. Valley-Wide's Menifee Park Manager, Recreation Supervisor, Inspectors and Landscape Contractor are constantly evaluating tree needs as part of their routine park, streetscape and facility inspections. The City's claim that separately documenting tree service would somehow provide an added benefit is without merit.

Valley-Wide wants LAFCO to know that it is not only a respected recreation and park district, but also a well celebrated one. Its memberships and accomplishments include:

 - Missy Galloway, Aquatics Facility Recreation Supervisor, American Red Cross Lifeguard Instructor Trainer and Certified Aquatics Facility Operator.
 - David Knight, Aquatics Facility Maintenance Supervisor, Certified Aquatics Facility Operator.

- Local involvement with service clubs: Kiwanis and Exchange Club.

III. CONCLUSION

In summary, Valley-Wide is concerned not only with the tone and tenor of the City’s Application, but also the content of the City’s Application. If LAFCO were to approve the detachment and transfer the authority to levy and collect assessments within the portions of the LMDs detached from Valley-Wide, from Valley-Wide to the City, both the City and Valley-Wide would be left with legally infirm LMDs with legally invalid assessment authority. Both Valley-Wide and the City, and more specifically the residents and taxpayers served by both entities, would be left in a worse position if LAFCO approves the detachment. This is especially concerning in light of the current City’s quest to obtain an increase to its sales tax to fund general municipal services and to, among other reasons, prevent cuts to senior, disabled and youth programs.

For the reasons specified above, Valley-Wide respectfully requests that LAFCO not approve the City's Application for detachment. Further, Valley-Wide also respectfully requests the opportunity to submit supplements to this comment letter in the event documentation produced by the City for Valley-Wide, in response to the Public Records Act request referenced earlier in this letter, includes information Valley-Wide believes may be of benefit to LAFCO as it considers the City's Application.

Corrections and Clarifications to Information Included in City of Menifee’s Detachment Application

The Valley-Wide Recreation & Park District (“Valley-Wide”) submits this information in order to correct many instances of false information set out by the City of Menifee’s (“City”) in support of its application to LAFCO for detachment from Valley-Wide (“Application”). The information included in the chart below, illustrates the poor grasp the City has of the services provided by Valley-Wide within the City.

As identified and discussed in Valley-Wide’s Comment Letter to LAFCO, to which this Exhibit “A” is attached, there is a legal impediment LAFCO’s ability to transfer to the City the ability to levy and collect assessments from the LMDs located within the City’s boundaries (i.e., any such transfer would violate the provisions of Proposition 218). Despite this legal impediment to the transfer, Valley-Wide believes it is important to correct the false information the City included in its Application regarding the City’s assumptions in allocation of costs and revenues of the various Landscape Maintenance Districts (“LMDs”) currently located within both Valley-Wide and the City.

15	<p>The City is incorrect in stating that that through December, 2015 it exceeded the revenue and participation benchmarks set by Valley-Wide in the previous year at the same time. (See chart on page 15 of the City's Application).</p> <p>The attendance charts prepared by Valley-Wide, attached to this Exhibit "A" as Attachment "1," set out attendees during Valley-Wide's operations as well as the same attendee information provided by the City in its reports. We wanted to point out the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Using the same tracking methodology for attendance at the 2 community center facilities (Kay Cenicerros and Lazy Creek) we observe that the City's attendance numbers actually decrease by 5,558 from Valley-Wide's attendance numbers the previous year. The only attendance numbers used to calculate Valley-Wide's attendance was actual community center attendance. Therefore, the City's attendance figures for these centers is actually 16,238 instead of the 50,783 as they report. • The Lazy Creek attendees (shown in orange) represent attendees in classes offered at this location for entire month. Estimates for special events, facility rentals, sports field uses are not included in these attendance numbers. • The Kay Cenicerros attendees (shown in blue) represent attendees in classes and programs offered at this location for the entire month; and, this includes classes taught by contract instructors and those open to everyone at no charge. Estimates for special events, facility rentals, sports field uses are not included in these attendance numbers. • City of Menifee Kay Cenicerros / Lazy Creek attendee numbers are taken directly from City recreation reports.
15	<p>The City's chart on page 15 is misleading. The "Contract (VWRPD)" "Expense" column includes the City's personnel costs. Valley-Wide's expenditures for this period were actually \$317,860.70, including \$13,290 worth of City request special projects, as opposed to the figure the City provided, which is 238% more than Valley-Wide's costs.¹</p>

¹ The number of incorrect dollar amounts included by the City in the Application are numerous. Valley-Wide has tried to identify the major areas of concern. Additionally much of the information included in the "Section C. Plan of Services" portion of the City's Application is also set out in "Section F. Fiscal Impact"

15	<p>The City's chart on page 15 is misleading. The revenues reported are not verifiable since both entities received program fees and revenues. Additionally the revenues are not comparable because the City's fee schedule was not effective, and, therefore, could not be charged by Valley-Wide on the City's behalf, until they became effective in the latter part of August 2014 (upon the City's adoption of City Resolution 14-391). City Resolution 14-391 was adopted well after services started, and during the period of time for which no fees had been established, the City directed Valley-Wide not to impose fees until Valley-Wide received the City's fee schedule.</p>
17-18	<p>The discussion in the City's Application starting in the last paragraph of page 17 and continuing onto page 18, is a blatant mischaracterization on the part of the City, regarding discussions at community workshops held as part of development of the City's Parks, Trails, Open Space and Recreation Master Plan. These community workshops were heavily guided by City staff, which is not a best practice when developing this type of a master plan document, as it is counter-intuitive to obtaining candid information from community members. Additionally, based on District staff's observations of the community workshops attended, there was no groundswell of public sentiment regarding the need to have parks and trails operated by a single agency.</p>
18	<p>Valley-Wide finds curious the City's description of the high urgency to converting turf to drought resistant plants in light of the City's attempts to block Valley-Wide's efforts in furthering such conversion. Although the City recognizes that Valley-Wide is the landscape authority, they have red-tagged the maintenance improvement and imposed conditions that are both unreasonable and inconsistent with past Valley-Wide and industry standards. For example, unnecessary plan checks, notice of code violations, equipment and material changes, exerting the City's new construction standards on non-new construction projects, as well as disregarding Valley-Wide's already recognized state-wide used landscape standards.</p>

portion of the City's application (albeit in the form of a very condensed three page summary). All comments by Valley-Wide regarding inaccuracies in the City's statements included in the "Section C. Plan of Services" portion of the City's Application, carry over, to the extent applicable, to the "Section F. Fiscal Impact" portion of the Application.

18	<p>The City-Wide signature events are already in place and it is unlikely that the proposed detachment will have any impact on attendance. National and international softball and baseball tournaments are regularly scheduled but only at Valley-Wide facilities as the host agency. These tournaments bring in an average 70,000 – 100,000 visitors to Valley-Wide sites. Additionally, because the City’s events are primarily for the local community, the City should not count on increased transient taxes.</p>
21	<p>The City’s statements are not accurate as related to Riverside LAFCO’s consideration of Valley-Wide’s Sphere of Influence (SOI) on December 11, 2014, and LAFCO’s recommendations regarding City assuming park and recreation services throughout its boundaries.</p> <p>Simply put, the statements are not supported by the Minutes of the Dec. 11, 2014 LAFCO Meeting or the related LAFCO staff report. LAFCO approved adding the Lakeview/Nuevo area to Valley-Wide’s SOI, although it did not approve the addition of areas in the City. There is no discussion of the factors listed on p. 21 in the LAFCO Minutes or the LAFCO staff report. Rather, the staff report on the item included LAFCO staff’s recommendation for expanding Valley-Wide’s SOI to include the entire City, finding that the amendment “is appropriate since most of the City of Menifee is already in either the District or its current SOI and the City is currently contracting with the District to maintain all City parks and run recreation programs within the City...” The staff report also stated that the amendment “will also provide for accountability and consistent planning.”</p> <p>While LAFCO’s action on December 11, 2014 did include direction to Valley-Wide to work with the City to develop a plan with the City for transition of park and recreation services to the City, the City’s statements regarding LAFCO’s recommendation specifying critical benchmarks, and the list of those benchmarks, only appear to be supported by the City’s own documents and reports, such as its Community Services FY2015-16 Mid-Year Report and City-Wide Park and Landscape Analysis. Additionally, as stated in Valley-Wide’s Comment Letter to LAFCO on the City’s Application, while Valley-Wide did reach out to the City on numerous occasions to discuss the possible transition of services, Valley-Wide’s invitations were never acted on by the City.</p>

23	<p>Although the City states that District oversight for services in the City occurs at Valley-Wide headquarters in San Jacinto, Valley-Wide oversight for services in the City actually occurs at Wheatfield Park in the City with the assistance of the Administration staff in San Jacinto. The Menifee Community Center is staffed by a Park Manager who provides maintenance to all Valley-Wide’s parks and facilities within City limits and a Recreation Coordinator.</p>
23-24	<p>The City’s list of contract classes for Menifee Community Center (page 24) is missing Gymnastics, and lists an inaccurate fee amount for Line Dancing.</p> <p>The City’s chart of classes offered at Marion V. Ashley Community (page 23) Center chart is missing Heartsaver First Aid, and the fee amounts for CPR Hero Training, Heartsaver CPR/AED, Kinder Gym, Beginning Gymnastics, Advanced Gymnastics, Competition Dance Team, are inaccurate. (See Attachment 3, District Summer Activities Guide.)</p>
25	<p>The City’s list of “Rentals (Outdoor)” on page 25 is missing Menifee ASA.</p>
25	<p>While it is correct that fees for facility rentals and field use are not listed in Valley-Wide’s brochure or website, the facility use fees and information is always available to the community upon request (See Attachment 4, District, Facility Use Procedure; Attachment 5. District Fee Schedule.). Other service fees (activities, sports, special events) are always published in Valley-Wide Brochure, activity flyers and website.</p>

25	The chart of Athletic Field Rates and Rentals included on page 25 is inaccurate. The chart omits multiple categories of facilities and fees.

The Special Event list included on p. 26 is accurate but it does not include events for which Valley-Wide partners with other organizations (such as 4th of July Celebration, Veterans Day, Battle of the Badges, Joey's Pals, etc.).</p>
26	For clarification, routine and general maintenance for all Valley-Wide's parks and facilities within City limits is performed by Valley-Wide's Menifee Park Manager, Recreation Supervisor, Recreation Aides, Landscape Inspectors and Landscape contractor.
26-27, 42, 43	Contrary to the City's statements, Marion V. Ashley Community Center and Park, and Eller Park do have some operational costs funded by the LMDs – mostly utilities.
27	Contrary to the City's allegations regarding the 4.73 acres of undeveloped land, conveyed by the County to Valley-Wide, Valley-Wide has had constant communication with the County regarding this property, and the property ownership has changed. Valley-Wide has maintained the property without interruption since the County changed ownership to Valley-Wide. There are ongoing discussions regarding a multi-agency use with park amenities as planned and another public building. Additionally, the County is aware of Valley-Wide's efforts to allocate funds for the site improvement.

40	<p>The City's claim that maintenance of certain areas is delivered through a private vendor is only partially correct, Valley-Wide's Menifee Park Manager, Recreation Supervisor, Inspectors and Landscape Contractor provide this service.</p>
41	<p>In the chart on page 41 of operating revenue and expenditures, the figure in the "Total" cell for the Levy Line is incorrect, it should be \$3,765,589. The other numbers used in these calculations are consistent only if areas outside of City limit zones are removed from the Engineer's Budget Report, which as explained in Valley-Wide's Comment Letter to LAFCO regarding the City's Application, is legally problematic.</p>
42	<p>The "In City" Parcels figure used on page 42 and the "total: Current Parcels/EDU) figure used on page 41 are not consistent. Aside from this error, Valley-Wide reiterates legal impediment to underlying assumption in the City's Application that it will be given authority to levy and collect assessments from the parcels within its boundaries following detachment.</p>
42	<p>The Fund Balances reported on page 42 are misleading because they cover zones inside and outside of the City Boundaries for Menifee North and Menifee South. Additionally, the Menifee North figure is incorrect and should be \$1,165,616 if taken from the 2015 audit report as stated. Again, Valley-Wide reiterates legal impediment to underlying assumption in the City's Application that it will be given authority to levy and collect assessments from the parcels within its boundaries following detachment.</p>

43	The City's chart on page 43 inaccurately reports "Valley-Wide Actual" figures. These are figures taken from Assessment Engineer Reports; and not actuals, and therefore the use of the word "Actual" is incorrect. Additionally, the savings from the City's math is interestingly only supported by the City's own reports and documents such as the City Staff Report for the December 16, 2015 City Council meeting and "Community Services FY2015-16 Mid-Year Report and City-Wide Park and Landscape Analysis.
43	Assuming that the legal impediment to the City's proposed detachment didn't exist (i.e., assuming no violation of Proposition 218 would result by the detachment as proposed by the City), Valley-Wide wants to point out that if the City is detached from Valley-Wide, then all City residents previously located within Valley-Wide will be required to an "Out of District" charge to use facilities. This includes Menifee ASA, Menifee Little League, Menifee AYSO and Menifee Youth Soccer to name a few in addition to charter schools and other service groups. Additionally, City of Menifee Leagues will also rank lower on priority for purposes of facility scheduling and use.
43	The City misstates Valley-Wide's response to its PRA request. Valley-Wide has provided the City with all Valley-Wide's responsive records, and further, to the extent the City believes that requested records were not provided, Valley-Wide on numerous occasions has asked the City to meet to go over Valley-Wide's records/ open up Valley-Wide's records for inspection, in order to identify records the City of interest to the City.
44	The City's "Menifee North Budget" on page 40 is misleading as it is an apples to oranges comparison due to the Menifee North LMD having parcels inside and outside of the LMD. Using 2015 District audited financials, extrapolating zones not in City boundaries, Valley-Wide's bottom line is approximately 24.2% better (2 years ago) or \$146,262 (District Audited financial report a total savings of \$154,062) versus \$117,731 (\$97,031+\$20,701).
45	The City's "Menifee South Budget" on page 45 is misleading as it is an apple to oranges comparison due to the Menifee South LMD having parcels inside and outside of the LMD. Using 2015 District audited financials for the entire zone (not removing zones outside of City boundary this time, Valley-Wide's bottom line is approximately 58% better (2 years ago) or \$39,886 (District audited financial report a total savings of \$108,302) versus \$68,326 (\$56,312+\$12,014).

46	Regarding the information included in the “Menifee Parks Budget” figure on page 46, using 2015 Valley-Wide’s audited financials, Valley-Wide’s bottom line is approximately 71% better (2 years ago) or \$119,900 (District Audited financial report a total savings of \$288,330) versus \$168,430 (\$14,9761+\$18,669).
47	The City is over-estimating revenues and under-estimating expenses. The City has grossly understated the utility expenses to operate these facilities. Valley-Wide has history of electric utility expenses for Marion Ashley and Eller Park of \$57,000 and \$6,500 respectively. Additionally, the District’s water utility expenses are \$43,000 and \$42,500 respectively. The City budget also estimated nearly an additional \$40,000 in revenue. Using the actual utility numbers, it is appropriate to increase their expenditure total by \$71,000 to make it \$486,939. This is 21% higher than the District’s \$401,907 actual costs.

Facility Use Procedure





VALLEY-WIDE RECREATION AND PARK DISTRICT

FACILITY USE PROCEDURE

1. Permits for the use of the park and recreation facilities (buildings, grounds and equipment) shall be issued by the Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District only with the approval of the site supervisor and shall be consistent with District ordinance governing such use.
2. The use of such facilities shall be consistent with the use of buildings and grounds for park and recreation purposes, and must not interfere with the regular conduct of recreation programs. Recreation programs in park and recreation buildings or on park property shall receive first priority over usage by any other group or organization, whether day, afternoon or evening sessions, and permits issued to any group may be revoked if it becomes unavoidably necessary for the District to use the space at the same time. If and when such action is necessary, every care shall be exercised by the responsible staff member(s) involved to give the permit holder as much advance notice as is possible.
3. Authorized groups may use certain equipment provided it is not removed from the premises. Use of equipment must be specified in the application for Use Permit. (*Note: Permit does not entitle anyone to the exclusive use of a park.)
4. All applications for use must be signed or co-signed by an adult, which adult shall agree to be responsible for said use. All activities must have adult supervision while using park and recreation facilities to insure adequate control. Application must be made on District "Request for Use of Facilities Form".
5. Any group granted the use of any park and recreation facilities shall use them only for such purposes as are specified in the permit for use and shall limit the use to the facility requested, i.e., the building, tennis courts or other area.
6. Use of facilities shall not be granted free of charge:
 - a. For religious meetings, services or gatherings (unless for recreational purposes) in compliance with the State of California, Constitution (Article 16, Section 5, State of California, Constitutional Opinion of the Attorney General 59-214).
 - b. To any group or individual, political or otherwise, that advocates the overthrow of the United States Government or State of California by force or violence or other unlawful means.
 - c. When for any reason, as determined by the General Manager, such use may not be in the best interest of the community.

7. No permit shall be issued for a period longer than nine months (September to May) without approval. As summer months require different usages of park and recreation facilities, permits for summer and for fall, winter and spring must be filed separately and comply with ruling #4 above. Buildings are normally closed on all holidays as observed by the District and permits will not be granted on these days without prior approval.
8. Groups using District facilities are responsible to pick up the necessary keys and equipment needed for their activity during business hours or otherwise agreed upon. Weddings, receptions and private parties, doors will be opened and closed by Valley-Wide. (Groups using the facilities on weekends must pick up keys on the Friday before.) All groups are responsible for returning keys and equipment the day following their event. (Saturday & Sunday excluded) All activities shall cease and the facilities shall be locked at 11:00 p.m. No groups will be allowed to remain, stay or loiter in the District facility between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. of the following day, without prior approval of the Program Superintendent.
9. Each individual or group using District facilities or equipment, is responsible for its condition following its use. A refundable damage deposit will be charged to all groups using District facilities or equipment (See Fee Schedule). This deposit will be refunded to the user following the event provided that the facility or equipment is not damaged, normal wear and tear excepted. (Groups are responsible for picking up all litter from their event.)
10. **ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES:** No person shall bring alcoholic beverages into, nor consume any alcoholic beverages while in a District park without a special permit issued by the Board of Directors. Alcohol is permitted in a District building upon approval of the General Manager. However, a special permit issued by the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board is required in all District facilities if alcohol is to be sold.
11. The District will not be responsible for accidents or loss of individual property. If decorations are to be used, they must be flame retardant treated and approved by the Recreation Supervisor and must be removed before the group vacates the facility.
12. Security guards are required at all events. The Security Guard Company must be licensed and insured or bonded, (security must be independent of the event). A copy of your contract with the Security Company and evidence of payment must be provided 14 days prior to scheduled use. One security guard for each 100 people in attendance, plus one guard to patrol the parking lot and restrooms. Any other arrangement must be approved by the General Manager.
13. No high-heeled shoes allowed in gymnasiums.
14. No smoking,

15. Use Priorities: *Priorities for the use of park and recreation facilities will be based on the following:*

Group I: Recreation groups, quasi-recreation groups, community service, and schools.

Group II: Non-profit organizations, clubs and associations which may be closed to The general public but must be for general character building or welfare purposes; cultural activities which have a prime objective of a civic or recreational nature; activities that provide moral and physical improvement for the good of the community.

Group III: Weddings, receptions and private parties.

Group IV: Businesses, groups, associations or individuals who use the facility for any type of profit-making activity or event or for personal gain.

16. Equipment: Tables, chairs, bleachers, etc. may be made available to community organizations on a case by case basis depending on availability. (Chairs @ \$3.00 each, Tables @ \$5.00 each, Bleachers @ \$25.00 each, etc.)

17. Insurance: Each group needs to provide Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District with a Certificate of Insurance naming **Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District** as Additional Insured, (\$1,000,000 liability), also including an **Additional Endorsement form** with Valley-Wide Recreation & Park District named on it. Insurance forms must be on file in our office before final approval of facility usage.

18. Liquor Liability: Any group utilizing the facility and serving alcohol, must provide Valley-Wide with a Liquor Liability policy, naming Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District additional insured.

FEE SCHEDULE

A set-up fee will be charged on all set-ups, i.e., chairs, all banquet type activities or any other activities involving the use of tables or prepping of ball fields.

Applications for use of facilities by non-profit organizations must be submitted and signed by an officer of said non-profit organization. Proof of non-profit status must be submitted upon request of a District representative.

A \$100.00 non-refundable deposit of rent is due at the time a reservation is made. Full payment of rent and deposit is due 14 days prior to the date of use of facility. All fees will be forfeited if reservation is canceled within 2 weeks prior to use date. There will be a charge of 10% of rental and deposit on any cancellation. Exception: Group IV Softball Fields (see page 5 for details).

No direct payments shall be made to a leader or any employees of the District at the time of usage without prior approval of the Recreation Supervisor.

All checks should be made payable to Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District.

NOTE: Any event with alcohol will be required to provide a Certificate of Insurance naming the District as additional insured plus have a liquor liability policy see #18.

Rentals by out-of-District individuals increase total fee 25%.

DID YOU KNOW?



A 200 pound man wearing men's dress shoes with a regular heel will exert less than 30 lbs. pressure per square inch. However, the latest ladies' high-fashion, thin heels, known as stiletto heels, can seriously damage all types of floor covering. A 110 lb. woman wearing these shoes exerts in excess of 1,000 lbs. pressure per square inch. These shoes can dent hardwood floors, chip ceramic tile, puncture carpet and pad, and dent vinyl floors. This is the return of a problem that our industry encountered 20 years ago. It was not then, nor is it now, considered to be manufacturing defect of floor covering materials by any of the floor covering manufacturers.





City of Menifee staff has reviewed the comments submitted by Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District (VWRPD) dated August 26, 2016 regarding the City's application for detachment of the District from within City boundaries. Staff has compiled a list of responses to the various claims presented by VWRPD as outlined below:

1. **Section IA, Page 2, Par 2** – reference to parcels inside and outside of the City boundary. This is an incorrect statement with one exception – Menifee South, Zone 6. LMD and zones summarized below:
 - a. Menifee Parks – all zones are complete and inclusive inside the City boundary.
 - b. Menifee North – comprised of 9 zones. The City has included zones which are within the City boundaries only (zones 1, 2, 4, 5, and 8). These zones are complete/intact and exist solely inside the City. Four zones (zones 3, 6, 7, and 9) are located completely outside of the City and were not included in the scope of this application.
 - c. Menifee South – comprised of 16 zones. 12 zones (zones 1, 2, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, 11, 12, 14, 15, and 16) are complete/intact and exist solely inside the City. Three zones (zones 3, 9, and 13) are located completely outside of the City and were not included in the scope of this application. Lastly, one zone (zone 6) is bisected by the City boundary as noted in page 41 - 42, and 60 of the LAFCO Application.
2. **Section IA, Page 2, Par 4** – reference to violation of Article XIII D, section 4(a) – Proposition 218. This is incorrect and follows as such – as long as the City is not changing the methodology or increasing the assessments beyond the maximum rates, then Proposition 218 would not be applicable. Additionally, as long as the zones within Menifee can stand alone and the funds being collected are not being pooled to complete the



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maintenance then the proposed detachment is allowable. Evidence supporting this follows:

- a. Individual annexation engineer's reports for each annexation/zone by tract(s) containing budgets and maintenance items specific to the tract(s) associated with the development.
- b. Individual budgets calculated and illustrated in the annual engineer's reports each year containing individualized zones and funds for each annexation/zone
- c. Additionally the City has already completed several detachments from Riverside County, one of which is an exact scenario with the Riverside County in the transition of LLMD 89-1C. This LLMD is a County wide LMD consisting of multiple zones and sub-locations. A specific example is Zone 3, which encompasses territory both inside and outside of the City. The City successfully transitioned the portions of LLMD 89-1C, including the portions of Zone 3, within the City and has been maintaining as such without any issues.
- d. Lastly, and most notably, VWRPD themselves has already had a zone from their French Valley LMD detached to the City of Murrieta. Zone 10 is noted in the annual engineer's report to have been annexed to the City of Murrieta. See engineer's report titled "Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District Landscape Maintenance Districts Fiscal Year 2015/16 Engineer's Report", page 9, first paragraph for reference. No other information is provided but considering the fact the structure of the remaining French Valley zones mirrors that of the Menifee LMD zones the question should be asked what, if anything, is different in this case? This example also illustrates the detachment of an LMD zone with a transportation corridor component as all current French Valley LMD zones have this line item. Therefore, assuming Zone 10 also had a transportation corridor component it would prove as an example of pooled funds being used for non-tract specific maintenance. More information should be requested on this detachment to see what actions were considered/implemented as part of these proceedings.

3. **Section IB (entirety of Section)** – reference to Proposition 218 violation. Please see response #2 above.
4. **Section IC, Page 5, No. 1** – “The City’s Application is Not Fiscally Viable without the Transfer of the Authority to Levy and Collect Valley-Wide’s Previously Authorized Assessments.”



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VWRPD's statement is correct that the viability of a successfully detachment implies the transfer of the "Authority to Levy and Collect" from VWRPD to the City. The Application submitted by the City clearly expresses this intent with the expectation that all properties funded by the three LMDs would be included in the transition to City management and maintenance. The City will use the LMD assessment proceeds to complete the approved services in the same order and manner as described in the engineer's reports and in the same manner as VWRPD claims to be completing the same services. Minimal funding is proposed from the City's General Fund to support two facilities not explicitly included in any special tax districts (Eller Park and Marion Ashley Center/Park). The City's proposed sales tax measure is unrelated to the detachment proceedings as staff has included all General Fund operating costs in the City's expenditure and revenue budgets for future fiscal years; post-detachment.

5. **Section II, Page 6, Par 1** – reference to the City's false statements. VWRPD has provided incomplete annexation engineer's reports even with subsequent follow up public records requests that specifically reference the incomplete documents. The City has made reasonable assumption based on the information VWRPD was willing to share. While one can only speculate VWRPD purposely provided incomplete information it brings into question:
 - a. How are they able to effectively and accurately administer the LMDs with such a lack of pertinent information? (e.g. maintenance detail as to the type, quantity, and location of the improvements)
 - b. How are they representing the best interest of the property owners with incomplete records as to the type, quantity, location, and cost estimates of the maintenance costs being imposed on the properties with the assessments?
 - c. How are they able to effectively contract out and complete the maintenance with such information gaps?
 - d. Lastly, to the question of purposely providing incomplete records, if the district does in fact have missing and incomplete annexation engineer's reports, and the questions listed above notwithstanding, how is it that in response to a subsequent public records request, VWRPD did in fact provide a copy of a previously provided incomplete engineer's report, this time complete and not missing the budget detail page that had been previously omitted? Reference is made to Menifee North LMD Zone 14 Annexation Engineer's Report.



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- e. Additionally, to date, VWRPD has only provided partial information regarding the LMDs and Zones. A summary follows. The missing information ranges from maintenance exhibits to the budget detail which includes the maintenance quantities. In these cases, we've reversed engineered VWRPDs documents using VWRPDs maintenance rates and dividing by the total budget to estimate the quantities of the applicable maintenance types.
 - i. Total zones requested – 29
 - ii. Total zones completely satisfied – 2
 - iii. Total zones remaining incomplete – 27
 - iv. Total zones never provided at all – 2

6. Section IIA, Page 6-7, Nos. 1-2 – Operation of Detention Basins

- a. It is true, the City is only responsible under the MS4 Permit to manage basins, including those that serve as dual purpose (flood control & water quality purposes), that the City owns. However, per the MS4 Permit:
 - The City can report on “other dischargers” that blatantly discharge pollutants to City owned MS4 facilities, including those managed by the District. VWRPD is considered an “Other Potential Discharger to the City MS4” as defined in Appendix 2 of Order No. R8-2010-0033 (NPDES No. CAS618033). Although the City cannot regulate or enforce actions against them if they are for example discharging pollutants to our MS4, but the City can report on other dischargers to higher authority such as the State or the Regional Board for any potential violation
 - VWRPD, as owners of various parks and other recreation areas, may be regulated by the State (or the RB) under the Phase II – Permit, and likely have their own reporting responsibilities to do to the State.
 - The basins by definition, are not considered MS4, but they are BMP facilities and therefore subject to NPDES requirement for BMPs made part of Water Quality Management Plans.
 - BMPs that VWRPD operate and maintain within City ROW are actually property of the City, as they should have been transferred to the City upon incorporation. Just like anything owned by the County Transportation within the ROW, with incorporation, they become City owned. Note that landscaping can be considered BMP facilities if they were designed to serve as WQ facilities.



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- b. VWRPD's basins, although may not be considered MS4 by definition, could be subject to a Phase II Permit regulation, which City staff believes VWRPD falls under.
- c. Page 8, paragraph after (iv): VWRPD is required to obtain a permit, especially if they are considered a Phase II operator.

7. **Section IIB, Page 8, Par 1** – reference to VWRPD services being subpar. The City's perspective on the quality of services provided by VWRPD during the contracted operation of west side facilities is informed by opinions of residents and professional staff employed by the City during the contract period. Numerous email correspondence were provided to VWRPD by City staff noting deficiencies in facility maintenance and insufficient recreation programming that did not meet City standards. The award of contract to VWRPD was executed at the direction of the City Council and did not follow the typical formal Request for Proposal (RFP) process. Coincidentally, City staff was in the midst of a formal RFP for landscape maintenance services for west side facilities before the City Council directed staff to award all relevant work to VWRPD. The scope of services in the maintenance RFP was all inclusive (with exception of tree trimming). Despite this detail, ordinary maintenance tasks such as irrigation repair, replanting, graffiti abatement, and others were omitted from VWRPDs contract responsibilities. This was brought to the attention of the City by VWRPD approximately one month in to the contract term, where after City staff were forced to execute a supplementary contract with VWRPD for "additional/extra work" not covered by the initial agreement. As a result, City Council were discouraged by the revelation and ultimately voted to execute the additional contract.

In May 2014 City Council and the Parks, Recreation and Trails Commission directed staff to issue a letter of intent to not renew both contracts for the upcoming year. City Council instructed staff to take over maintenance and operation of all west side facilities and programs effective July 1, 2015.

8. **Section IIB2:**
Picnic Shelter/Gazebo Permits and Use Fees – As part of its comprehensive business plan, the City and the Community Services Department completed a Cost Study Analysis in 2014 with the adoption of Resolution No. 14-391 establishing a fee schedule for recreation programs, services, and park facility use in the City of Menifee. A fee study for these services is common practice in municipal government and consistent with fee schedules adopted by other cities throughout



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Riverside County. The City's consultant derived the shelter use fee based on several factors including cost of labor, maintenance, coordination, and administration to process reservations. As such, the established fees are inclusive with the intention of full cost recovery; not profit making. Community Services Department staff and recreation professionals from other municipal governments have instituted shelter reservations as a precaution to ensure orderly use of the facilities. It has been staffs' experience that without reservation procedures, park patrons can occasionally end up quarrelling over use and access. Additionally, the opportunity for a City staff person to meet and greet shelter permittees is an effective way to connect with the community and provide positive customer service.

Tree Maintenance Plan – The City asked for and never received any information regarding tree maintenance. We included tree maintenance in the budget to account for the service in the unexpected case that VWRPD had a separate calculation for tree service. Tree maintenance was never quantified specifically by way of tree counts or cost per tree being budgeted in the annexation engineer's reports. In this case the City felt it prudent to add the costs to the estimated budgets to ensure adequate coverage of costs and service in this project.

The following are responses to comments in VWRPDs Exhibits. We've referenced their "City Application Page No." for our comments:

1. Page 23-24 – The City's summary of east side activities and classes were derived from VWRPD's Winter 2015 published activity guide. The activity guide included in VWRPD's exhibits to the application response is from Summer 2016, which was published well after the City's detachment application had been submitted to LAFCO. As such, it is expected that several classes and activities have changed since the previous two seasons.
2. Pages 26-17, 42, 43 – "Marion V. Ashley Community Center and Park do have some operational costs funded by the LMDs – mostly utilities". If accurate, VWRPD is illegally using special tax district revenues to support facilities not itemized in the LMDs' engineer's reports. Special tax district revenues are restricted funds limited to facilities and activities identified in the respective formation and annexation documents. Use of these funds beyond the documented intent would require a positive vote from the assessed property owners for authority to do so. The City does not have and VWRPD has not provided proof of this occurring or being recorded.



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3. Page 40 – The City asked for and never received tree maintenance information. We included tree maintenance in the budget to account for the service in the unexpected case that VWRPD had a separate calculation for tree service. Tree maintenance was never quantified specifically by way of tree counts or cost per tree being budgeted in the annexation engineer's reports. In this case the City felt it prudent to add the costs to the estimated budgets to ensure adequate coverage of costs and service in this project.
4. Page 41 – their reference to the typo in the City application appears to be correct. Reference to numbers being used with zones outside of the City is incorrect. We only used numbers from the zones that lie within the City boundaries with exception to LMD South, Zone 6 which is referenced specifically in the City's application. This does not affect or change the bottom line collection of assessments for the LMD as a whole as represented by the grand totals in the Application.
5. Page 42 – Same as above, we only used data from zones within the City boundary with exception to LMD South, Zone 6 which is referenced specifically in the City's application.
6. Page 43 – reference to VWRPD "Actual" figures. This is correct, we used the FY15-16 Proposed numbers. However, in every single zone the "FY14-15 Actual" equaled the "FY15-16 Proposed" budget. So in effect we felt the FY15-16 to be actual numbers as evident of the previous year. Given this was the only information available we could change this reference to FY14-15 Actual if it makes them feel better.
7. Page 43 – reference to public records request – VWRPD has only provided partial information regarding the LMDs and Zones. A summary follows. The missing information ranges from maintenance exhibits to the budget detail which includes the maintenance quantities. In these cases, we've reversed engineered VWRPDs documents using VWRPDs maintenance rates and dividing by the total budget to estimate the quantities of the applicable maintenance types.
 - i. Total zones requested – 29
 - ii. Total zones completely satisfied – 2
 - iii. Total zones remaining incomplete – 27
 - iv. Total zones never provided at all – 2
8. Page 44 – The City's application and analysis only include zones located within the City boundaries.



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9. Page 44 – The City's application and analysis only include zones located within the City boundaries, with exception to Menifee South LMD, Zone 6 as noted in the application.

While these responses provide direct feedback on most of the more poignant claims made by VWRPD, it is not intended to be a complete and exhaustive rebuttal to the Districts objections. Staff has provided explanation and clarification on factual concerns as they relate to the accuracy and validity of the City's detachment application.
